From Father Schmeckel:

November 21 is the Memorial of the **Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary**. It commemorates when Saints Anna and Joachim, the parents of Mary, the Mother of Jesus, who brought Mary as a child to be offered to God in the Temple in Jerusalem. One author writes this about the Presentation of Mary:

"Though it cannot be proven historically, Mary's presentation has an important theological purpose. It continues the impact of the feasts of the Immaculate Conception and of the birth of Mary. It emphasizes that holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond." (ao to Franciscar

On November 22, the Memorial of **Saint Cecilia** is celebrated. She is a virgin martyr of the 3rd century. Many of the details of her life are unknown, and some have become a bit romanticized over the many centuries. What is clear, however, is that her story seems to have made an enormous impact on the Christians living in Rome. By the 5th century, there were Mass settings written in her honor and stories told of her martyrdom. Her name has also been secured in the first Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass (often called the 'Roman Canon') – which further indicates the high esteem that she had in the first centuries of the Church. She is the Patron Saint of musicians and can often be seen in stained-glass windows in choir lofts. On this feast day, let us pray especially for all of our musicians, who help us to elevate our voices and praise God more perfectly during our liturgical celebrations.

I want to say 'thank you' again to all those who were able to contribute to the **Catholic Stewardship Appeal**. At Saint John Evangelist Parish, we are at 97.64 % of our goal of \$35,190.00. At Blessed Trinity Parish, we are at 114.90% of our goal of \$43,000.00. These numbers are a testament to your generosity and care for the local Church – even beyond our own parishes and communities. 

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION GRADES 7-12 UPDATE:

Today is the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time and we are nearing the end of our Liturgical year in the Church. Just as the days are getting shorter with more darkness, our readings are getting more strident with calling us out of darkness into light. And what, or who, is this light? Jesus, the light of the world!! One of the things we do in our Religious Education year, is to help prepare 11th grade students to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in



the Fall of their Senior year. Among the things they learn are the 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit. At St. John Evangelist Parish, we have a gorgeous mosaic in the floor right as you enter through the main doors of the Church. Please take time to notice this! These gifts, found in Isaiah 11:1-3 are: wisdom, understanding, knowledge, right judgment, courage, piety and fear of the Lord. I think today's Gospel about the parable of the talents can be summarized as those servants who possess "fear of the Lord" and the one who simply "fears the Lord." The difference between the two comes down to their relationship with God. deep down know that God is the giver of all good things and we honor and love Him sincerely, this will give us trust and full reliance on Him and will guard us from the temptations of sin because we will hate the idea of disrespecting Him. It is like a child who knows how much his/her parents love and sacrifice for them and their well-being, so they strive to make them proud and attempt to do what is right and not what is easy. Conversely, fearing the Lord is being afraid of God and thinking that He is punitive God is demanding for sure, but that is because He loves us SO and venaeful. Maybe with the start of our New Year in the Church, we can make some much. "resolutions" to fear the Lord more, for that is the beginning of wisdom (Proverbs 9:10), another gift of the Holy Spirit!! Some possible suggestions that we tell our Religious Education students is to pray EVERY day-this is talking and listening to God; to attend Mass EVERY Sunday-it's not just a Commandment, but an opportunity to be fed and to give thanks; to go to Confession regularly-this is healing and strengthens us to resist future sin; to read the Bible EVERY day-God's love letter to us and finally, to carry a rosary in our pocket to remind us to trust and hope in God. The key to replacing a habit of vice with a habit of virtue is also contained in today's Gospel....to be faithful in small matters. Then our desire to please Him will bring those glorious words one day, "come, share your master's joy." From all of us at 7-12gr. SJE RE, have a blessed and happy Thanksgiving! 





On November 19, Bishop Barron offers inspiring insights into the mystery of Christ's presence in our lives as it is given to us in the Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist. On December 9, consider the relationship between the manger and the Eucharist. Join us for these videos and short discussion at a convenient time after Mass.

Dear Padre,

My grandmother says Catholics used to fast from midnight until they received Communion. When did the fasting time change to only one hour, and why?

The ancient discipline of fasting before Communion became a universal practice by the fifth century. Until 1953, those who would receive holy Communion refrained from consuming food, water, and medicine from midnight to the time of Communion. In 1953 and 1957, Pope Pius XII reduced the fast from food to three hours and from water for one hour (Christus Dominus and Sacram Communionem).



In 1966, Pope St. Paul VI further reduced the fast to one hour and allowed water and medicine at any time (Paenitemini). In 1973, he reduced the fast for the sick and elderly to fifteen minutes before Communion when one hour is prohibitive (Immensae Caritatis).

The loosening of the restrictions was in no way intended to lessen the reverence for the holy Eucharist. The changes were made to allow as many Catholics as possible to receive the Eucharist, which can be difficult when priests are in short supply. For the same reason, *Immensae Caritatis* also allowed the practice of having extraordinary ministers give Communion. Despite the changes to the Communion fast, unity and uniformity have been maintained. And of course, Catholics are free to fast before Communion beyond the duration and degree currently prescribed. •
