

From Father Schmeckel:

This Sunday marks the beginning of the season of Advent and our preparation for the celebration of Christmas. All of us have practical and material things that we do to prepare for these great holidays: preparing Christmas cards, shopping, cleaning, and so many other tasks. In all the busyness, don't forget to prepare your heart and your soul for the coming of Jesus, too! In my bulletin article this week, I would like to offer a few ways to prepare spiritually for Christmas!

- Prayer. Advent is a good time to evaluate our current habits of prayer: Do
 I pray every day? Do I make it a necessary part of my daily routines and habits? Should I increase or change my habits of prayer to better suit my state of life?
- 2. **Eucharistic Adoration**: Don't forget that Eucharistic Adoration happens every Thursday from 6:00 AM until 9:00 PM at Saint John's and from 8:00 until 8:50 AM at Blessed Trinity Parishes.
- 3. **Daily Mass.** During the season of Advent, we might consider adding a weekday Mass to our routine. Weekday Masses are often much shorter than Sunday Mass (approximately 30 minutes) so you might be able to come quickly right before work, school, or other obligations.
- 4. FORMED.org: Both of our parishes help to pay for a subscription to FORMED.org a website that has thousands of videos, audiobooks, workbooks, and more to help you grow in your faith. These resources are available for you and your family to use at no cost for you. Go to FORMED.org and search for "Blessed Trinity Sheboygan Fall" (for Saint John parishioners as well). This site will unlock an enormous amount of solid and dependable Catholic formational, educational, and entertaining content for you. I have set a goal for our parishes. My hope is to have 50 new individuals or families sign up to use FORMED before Christmas. If you are not already signed up, please consider doing it today.
- 5. **The Sacrament of Penance**. Last Sunday, I wrote about making use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation/Confession. This is a very straightforward way to prepare for Christmas. Please take a look at the extended hours and additional opportunities and avail yourself of the graces of this great Sacrament of Mercy.

This Friday, December 8, is the **Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary – a Holy Day of Obligation.** Mass times will be as follows:

Thursday, December 7 – 5:15 PM – Blessed Trinity Parish

Friday, December 8 – 6:45 AM – Saint John Evangelist Parish

Friday, December 8 – 6:30 PM – Blessed Trinity Parish

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is a feast celebrating Mary's conception without sin in the womb of her mother, St. Ann. From that moment she was preserved from the stain of Original Sin. Mary, under the title of the Immaculate Conception, is also the Patroness of the United States. Because of that, this Holy Day is also a good time for us to take the opportunity to pray for our country!

And just a reminder: The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be offered 45 minutes before every Holy Day Mass..



Welcoming the Season of Advent:

Advent, the four Sundays before Christmas begins this Sunday, December 3rd. It is the season of preparation leading up to Christmas Day. During these four weeks we anticipate the coming of Jesus as a baby. It's a time full of reflection, excitement, and hope as we prepare to celebrate His birth.



Advent, as a season of preparation, offers a wonderful opportunity to engage in activities that create a deeper connection to the true meaning of Christmas. Whether it's creating an Advent wreath, reading and discussing daily Scripture readings, or participating in acts of kindness and charity, these intentional activities foster a sense of anticipation and reflection.

Creating your own Advent wreath is a simple and meaningful activity. It's not too late to do that, and it only takes a few steps to create a wreath with four candles for a table in your home. The wreath can be a focal point for prayer and reflection. Each Sunday of Advent gather around the wreath, recite some prayers, and light a new candle to mark the progression of the Season and cultivate a sense of anticipation and reverence as you await the birth of Jesus.

Setting up a nativity crèche, a set of figures representing those who were present in Bethlehem during Jesus' birth including the Baby Jesus, Joseph and Mary, shepherds, angels, magi, and a variety of farm animals, helps those who see it reflect on Jesus' humble beginnings during the Advent Season. Catholics traditionally hide the figure of Baby Jesus and only add Him to the scene on Christmas Day. Nativity crèches come in all shapes and sizes. Most are small and can fit on a table. (It is said that the first nativity scene was actually created by St. Francis of Assisi in 1223.)

Putting up a Christmas tree can also serve as a reminder that for thousands of years the evergreen tree has been a sign of hope and life. For ancient people, it was a reminder during the winter season that sunlight and good weather would come again. Christmas trees are seen in homes and on display everywhere. For Christians their beauty and light can serve as a reminder of the hope we have in Jesus. Glowing warmly at the darkest time of year, they remind us that the light of Jesus still shines through the darkness just as it did when He was born on that first Christmas Day.

There are also quite a few important (and fun) feasts and celebrations during the Advent season. Look ahead to see what's coming up so you can plan small celebrations throughout the season.

All these intentional activities during the Season of Advent can foster a sense of anticipation and reflection and can also help us look forward to and prepare for a Christmas filled with faith, hope and love. May these four weeks of Advent also be filled with blessings for you and your loved ones.





Dear Padre,

Why are the Gospels Matthew and Mark so alike? Why did the Church keep both Gospels when so much of Mark seems to be a mirror image of Matthew?

The Gospels were written over time and used by the faithful when they gathered for worship. They read the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) and accounts of the life and ministry of Jesus collected by Matthew, Mark, and Luke.

The Christian communities were often great distances from one another. A community may have had access to only one of these accounts. There is considerable similarity because the Gospel writers depended on one another. All three Gospels include

some of the same incidents. Each also has incidents or details unique to that Gospel.

These were not the only accounts written about the life and ministry of Jesus. At some point, the Church had to decide which should be considered the inspired word of God. There were four accounts that were widely used: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. With their similarities and differences, the Church accepted these four accounts as Gospel—the Good News.
