# From Father Schmeckel:

During this Season of Advent, there is a change in the main emphasis of the Readings and the Prayers at Mass. From the First Sunday of Advent until this Third Sunday of Advent, December 17, the focus is on the Final Coming of Jesus and His spiritual coming to us through the Sacraments, prayer, and the life of the Church; but from now until Christmas Day, there is a change. We focus on the Incarnation and the coming of Jesus as the Infant Child in the manger at Bethlehem.



I encourage you to spend some time this coming week reading the Gospel

for each daily Mass. This can be a good way for all of us to invite Jesus more deeply into the hustle and bustle of Christmas, that might include buying gifts, and preparing extra meals and desserts! These Readings can be found on the US Bishops' website: usccb.org/bible/readings and are also available in many of the different Advent handouts and booklets.

Along with this change in emphasis, **the "O Antiphons"** begin in the prayer of the Church. Most of us are familiar with 'O Antiphons', even if we don't think we are. These antiphons come from the Liturgy of the Hours, that along with the Mass and Sacraments is one of the Church's only official prayers. These prayers form the verses of the popular hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel". They draw on the prophets and sayings of the Old Testament that all point to the signs and titles of the Messiah who is to come. One way to pray this week might include singing together or listening to one of the verses of this song each day.

If it has been more than a year since you last received this Sacrament, (you last went to Confession,) it's time to do so. There are many diverse times offered at our parishes and in the area – so there is probably no good excuse not to do this!

A reminder to make your plans ahead of time to attend Mass for both the Fourth Sunday of Advent and Christmas. Please see the schedule for both days that is included in this bulletin.

Looking ahead a little further: January 1, The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God is not a holy day of obligation this year since it falls on a Monday, nonetheless, it will be offered at 9:00 AM at Saint John-Evangelist Parish. You are encouraged to attend on this first day of the new year.

On Tuesday, January 2, we will begin a Tuesday evening Mass at Blessed Trinity at 6:00 PM. During this Mass, we might do a few things differently to offer other ways to pray and celebrate the holy sacrifice of the Mass. More information to come, but this might be a way for your family to deepen your faith in the Eucharist during the week.

# **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION GRADES 7-12 UPDATE:**

Today is the 3rd Sunday of Advent, sometimes referred to as "Gaudete Sunday" which is Latin for "rejoice." Notice that the priest wears rose or pink colored vestments and our 3rd candle on the Advent wreath is pink! This emphasis on JOY invites us to pause and reflect on the nearness of God, coming very soon to us in baby Jesus at Christmas! In our RE classes this Advent, our large group prayer sessions in Church have focused on



the hidden, humbleness of God. We see this in many of the Gospel parables, where Jesus talks about salt, light, yeast, mustard seeds, pearls, two small coins, etc. as indicators of the presence of God in our midst and how we, as followers and believers can imitate Jesus by "doing little things with great love." (St. Therese of Lisieux became a Saint and Doctor of the Church with her "little way.") Of course, the humility of God is most revealed in His true presence in the Blessed Sacrament!! Every time we participate in the Mass or rest with the Lord in silent Adoration, we should be overwhelmed that the God who made everything out of nothing is hidden under the form of bread and wine, as He becomes one with us. Like the little baby born in Bethlehem and called "Emmanuel, meaning God with us", through the reception of Jesus in all of the Sacraments, but especially in the Eucharist, we have "God within us" as well!! Mind-blowing, extravagant, unconditional, sacrificial love! This is WHO we celebrate at Christmas-Jesus, our Savior, Messiah and King, so "O, come let us adore Him, Christ the Lord!"

Some other Christmas carols that contain some hidden meaning that you may not have known are these...


- -O Little Town of Bethlehem-In Hebrew, Bethlehem means "house of bread." So the place where Jesus was born portends His Eucharistic presence! (Micah 5:2)
- -Away in a Manger-In Latin, "mangia" means "to eat." So, the place where Jesus lay is a feeding trough where animals would eat, but He has come as food for us to eat!! (Lk. 2:7)
- -Silent Night, Holy Night-I like puns and word play, so I think of this hymn as an ode to good St. Joseph, who was obedient to God's will for Him, even if he didn't understand it all. (Mt. 1:18-25) Joseph trusted God because he was a "silent knight and a holy knight" ready to heed the orders of his superior, Almighty God. We pray to be as trusting and humble as good St. Joseph.
- -Joy to the World-Joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5:22), so strive for the supernatural gifts that God wants to share and not settle for the counterfeits that the world offers. To have real and lasting JOY, remember to put Jesus first, Others second and Yourself last and even backwards, You Obey Jesus. Each day, a simple prayer to keep JOY in order, can help you stay focused on WHO we love, know and serve.
- -We Three Kings-The three Kings recognized the REAL King of Kings in baby Jesus and they were changed! (Mt. 2:1-12) As we prepare, rejoice and follow Jesus, we need to "orient" every detail of our days with faith and love as we draw near to Him, who is already so near to us. We just need new eyes of faith to see the real "treasure" of God, who is with us and within us.
- -We Wish You a Merry Christmas-Again, think of this greeting as "Mary Christmas" for with no mother, there would be no son. (Lk. 1:46-55) Mary always brings us to Jesus, so go to her as a powerful intercessor and ask Mary to help you love her Son and she will. From all of us at 7-12th grade RE, we watch and prepare this Advent for "O Come, o come Emmanuel." (Is. 7:14 and Mt. 1:23) See you at Mass!



Was Jesus born in a stable or a cave? The Christmas scene in our church has Jesus born in a little shed, but in my friend's church it looks more like a cave. The Bible says Jesus was born in a manger, so just where was Jesus born?

The Christmas scenes, sometimes called Nativity scenes or crèches, vary from church to church. In Scripture, we find more details about the Nativity in Luke's Gospel, but even he simply



says that Mary wrapped Jesus in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because the inn was full (Luke 2:7).

In none of the Scriptures do we have any details about what the place looked like, but since a manger is a place where caregivers feed livestock, we can assume that Jesus was born in a stable of some kind. At that time, small caves sometimes were used as stables.

Nativity scenes, though, are not an attempt to present a historically accurate picture of where Jesus was born. Rather, scenes of the birth of Jesus remind us of the special love that God shows for us in sending the Son to us. We do not care so much about creating an exact picture of what took place as we do of beholding the beauty and wonder of God born among us.
