

!Five ways for parents to prepare children for First Holy! !Communion:

The focus of many hours every week from September to May for our Catechists who work with our younger children is on the Sacraments. Second grade is when most children celebrate First Reconciliation and First Eucharist/First Communion, and parents and children are involved in the preparation for both. We are often asked what parents should keep in mind as they guide their children



toward the reception of these Sacraments and especially to prepare their children for First Communion. Here are five things we advise parents to do with their children and to begin doing the first four long before children enter Second grade.

! 1. Go to Sunday Mass.

We teach the children how beautiful, important, and special it is to receive Jesus' Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity in the Eucharist. If receiving Jesus in Holy Communion is wonderful and special, then we want children to learn, by example that receiving the Eucharist every Sunday at Mass is important.

2. Talk about the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

The real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is our belief that the bread and wine truly become the Body and Blood of Jesus. The Eucharist is not a symbol or a sign, but Jesus truly present. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops reminds Catholics that Jesus' "presence is not momentary nor simply signified, but wholly and permanently real under each of the consecrated species of bread and wine."

i 3. Receive Communion with reverence and practice receiving Holy Communion at home.

The more they practice, the more comfortable children will be on the day of First Communion. Use a small cracker and have children extend their hands to receive the cracker from you. Tell children to watch during the Communion procession when they are at Mass or watch a live-streamed Mass with them. They will see some adults and children who are good examples and some who are not very good. The children can learn reverence from watching others.

4. Praise and thank God for the great gift of the Eucharist/Communion.

Not only on the day of First Eucharist/First Communion, but after every Communion, praise and thank God for this great gift of our Lord who is shared with us in the Eucharist.

5. When planning First Eucharist/First Communion model reverence and focus on the Sacrament. This is an exciting time. There are special outfits. Often relatives and friends gather and there aren't presents and celebrations. It is important to remind children that all these things are being planned because they will be receiving Jesus in the Holy Eucharist for the first time.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Our Religious Education classes for 2022 began on January 5 with a Catholic trivia night! All of our students formed teams of various grades and proceeded to answer questions related to Popes, Sacraments, Mary, the rosary, CAGES and even ones on their Religious Education teachers and some Kohler trivia too! It was a fun and informative class, filled with lots of laughter and friendship! Please ask your students about this fun night-you may learn a few facts as well!! Our January 12 class centered on the living person of Jesus. More than anything this year, our goal



is to introduce our students to an encounter with Christ and His Church! How blessed we are as Catholics, to have Jesus truly, substantially present in the Eucharist and all of the Sacraments, but also within each one of us!! Today's gospel from John 2:1-11 is the familiar story of Jesus' first public miracle, where he changes water into wine at the wedding feast of Cana. This response to Mary's intercession of "do whatever He tells you" reveals Jesus' glory and that He is no ordinary rabbi! He has come as the promised Messiah for all of us! Why? Because He loves and cares about each of us and that He will be with us always! This is indeed "good news!" When we become mindful of what Jesus wants to do for each and every one of us, we find miracles all around us and so our deep desire for RE this year and beyond, is to fall in love with Jesus and for us to "do whatever He tells you!" Albert Einstein once said that "there are only two ways to live your life...one, as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though EVERYTHING is a miracle!" See you at the miracle of the Mass, where wine is changed into Jesus' blood!





Dear Padre,

I work hard all week and look forward to sleeping in on Sundays. Why should I get out of bed and go to Mass?

imagine that your parish provides suitable Mass times, even for late sleepers. But there are overpowering reasons for attending Mass. First, I'll discuss how the Mass is our present-day connection with the Last Supper, the Passover meal Jesus celebrated with his apostles. As observant Jews, they commemorated their ancestors' escape from slavery in Egypt. Jesus used his



final Passover meal to teach us how to escape a bondage crueler than the Jews experienced in Egypt—the enslavement of sin.

The next day, Good Friday, Jesus would die on the cross. Think of it: Jesus, the second person of the Trinity, became human to teach us about God's love for

us. The people's reaction to this goodness was to kill Jesus in an inhuman way.

In response, God would have been justified in destroying the world, as he did in reaction to the people's depravities during Noah's time. Instead, God gave us further evidence of his patience and forgiveness. There is nothing our Father would not forgive, including the sin of killing Jesus. At the Last Supper, Jesus said: "This is my blood..., which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:28).

Jesus' death, which we remember during the Mass, liberates us from sin. It also liberates us from death itself. Because Jesus in his mortal body was willing to die, he shows us the plan God the Father has for each of us—a resurrection like Jesus'. The Eucharist is our thanksgiving for these gifts from God.
