

WALKING THROUGH HOLY WEEK:

This week between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, called Holy Week, is the most sacred time of our church-year. During this special time, we enter into the passion of Christ — his crucifixion, death and resurrection. Lent officially ends and the Triduum begins at dusk on Holy Thursday and continues through dusk on Easter Sunday. Because



we can't separate Jesus' death from his resurrection, the Church teaches that this time, called The Triduum, is really one celebration that lasts for three days. It includes:

Holy Thursday

The evening Mass on Holy Thursday begins the Sacred Triduum. On this night we remember the Last Supper and celebrate the institution of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Holy Orders. At the end of the Mass, the sanctuary is stripped clean in preparation for the most somber of feasts, Family Faith Activity: Talk about how Jesus is really present in the Eucharist (Holy Communion) and how sharing in his body strengthens us to become the Body of Christ and to follow him each day.

Good Friday

Good Friday is a sacred remembrance of Jesus' crucifixion and death on the cross. It is a day of fasting and penance and a time to examine all of the places in our lives where we fail to follow Christ. Good Friday is not a Mass; The Eucharist (Holy Communion) that has been consecrated on Holy Thursday and kept in the tabernacle for adoration is distributed at this time.

Family Faith Activity: Pray the Lord's Prayer at bedtime on this night in remembrance of Christ's gift for all of salvation.

Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is the high point in the liturgical year. The vigil begins in darkness (sometimes outside) and the long procession of candlelight that enlivens the church reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world who has conquered all darkness and death. The Paschal candle that is lit at the Easter Vigil will remain in the church throughout the year as a sign of Christ's death and resurrection.

Family Faith Activity: During the day on Holy Saturday, spend some time as a family talking about Jesus' crucifixion, death and resurrection. Take a walk around your neighborhood looking for signs of new life in springtime. Talk about how Jesus' rising to new life is truly transformative and life changing. Prepare to attend Mass on Easter Sunday and to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection in a special way.

Time spent on Triduum celebrations/activities during Holy Week will make Easter Sunday and the Easter Season more meaningful for all!

children for their May 1st First Communion Day, volunteer Catechists/Teachers from our parish, Susan Vavra, Tricia Mikolyzk and Anna Baxter worked together to help them to know that Jesus offered his body/blood to his friends and to all of us at the Last Supper, and to understand that God/Jesus is really and truly present in the Eucharist.



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

The holiest week of the year begins today. On Palm Sunday, we commemorate the Lord's entrance into Jerusalem, where in Luke's Gospel (19:28-40) we proclaim with the crowd "blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord." Later in Mass and later in Luke's Gospel (22:14-23:56), we enter Jesus' passion and proclaim with the crowd "crucify Him, crucify Him."



How did we go from praise to crucifixion? How did Jesus go from King to innocent victim? What are we thinking? What must Jesus, in His humanity, be thinking? Perhaps a story by Max Lucado may help...

There once was a man deep in the jungle on an African safari. His guide wielded a machete to clear away the tall grass. The traveler was hot and tired, so he asked in frustration "where are we?" "Do you know the way?" "Where is the path?" The seasoned guide stopped and looked back at the man, replying "I am the path."

We ask the same questions, don't we? One minute we are praising Jesus, the next minute, nailing Him to the cross. Like the traveler, we are clueless about many things in this jungle of life. Rather than give us the answer, Jesus gives us a far greater gift, He gives us Himself and His example of not just going TO the cross, but going THROUGH the cross. Is the jungle gone? No. Is the grass still thick? Yes. Are there still predators and evil lurking in the weeds? Yes. But Jesus doesn't give hope by changing the jungle, he restores hope by giving us Himself. And he has promised to stay until the very end. What a guide we have in Jesus, who clears our path and leads the way by example. Thank God he has such passion for His passion! Be holy this week. IMPORTANT PALM SUNDAY & HOLY WEEK INFORMATION:

PALM SUNDAY: Masses on Saturday evening at 5:30 PM and on Sunday at 9:00 PM mark the beginning of Holy Week and commemorate the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. Before Mass, please come together in the Gathering Space for the blessing of the palms. Ushers will hand out palms as people enter church.



Blessed palms that have not been picked up will be available in the Gathering Space of the Church until noon on Holy Thursday.

HOLY THURSDAY: Mass at St. John Evangelist Parish at 7:00 is the beginning of the Sacred Easter Triduum and is a remembrance of the Last Supper and the memorial of the institution of the priesthood. At the conclusion, the Eucharist is moved to an altar of reposition and the altar is stripped. People are invited to spend time in prayer after this. The church will be open for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament for one hour after Mass.

GOOD FRIDAY: The 1:30 pm Liturgical Service at St. John Evangelist Parish recalls the suffering and death of Our Lord on the Cross. It includes the reading of the Passion, Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion. Veneration of the Cross may be done by bowing, genuflecting, or some other gesture of reverence. Out of an abundance of caution, the cross should not be kissed or touched. Each year, there is also a special collection for the Shrines in the Holy Land. The canopy doors of the Church will be open from 7:30 am until 5:00 pm to allow for personal prayer and meditation.

HOLY SATURDAY (EASTER VIGIL): The Easter Vigil begins 8:00 pm at Blessed Trinity Parish. On this night the Church keeps watch celebrating the resurrections of Christ in the sacramentals and awaiting his return in glory. This beautiful and inspiring Liturgy includes the Service of Light, Liturgy of the Word, Blessing of Water and Renewal of Baptismal Promises and the Mass itself. Holy Saturday Mass fulfills the Easter Sunday obligation.

EASTER SUNDAY: The Lord's Resurrection is at 7:30 and 9:00 am at St. John Evangelist and 10:30 am at Blessed Trinity.

DAILY REFLECTIONS FOR EASTER THROUGH PENTECOST: "Daily Reflections for Easter through Pentecost" booklets are now available in the basket on the table in the Gathering Space. Our Lenten journey of 2022 is almost over. Lent is indeed a blessed time, because all of us get a chance to pause for time to time to evaluate us. reaches out in many ways to serve the needs of adults and children in a third world country – Peru.

The Scriptural Lenten readings leading up to Easter Sunday never grow old. For Palm Sunday a Gospel Reading prior to the procession into Church is the beginning of the celebration of the Lord's Paschal Mystery.

Jesus was getting ready to enter His Passion. However, Jesus has carefully crafted how He would approach the slope of the Mount of Olives. He was not frightened or hesitant, knowing that this was the beginning of His Crucifixion. He will approach His incumbent crucifixion as a king – a simple king: untie the tethered colt, which no one has sat upon and bring it to me; tell the owners that 'the Master has need of it.' And, of course, their Master deserved a regal setting: "... threw their cloaks over the colt." Most appropriate for a King!!! The people spread their cloaks on the road – FOR THIS IS OUR KING. How befitting that the multitude of people began to praise God...: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord..." Of course, the Pharisees would shout out and demand that Jesus rebuke his disciples. Cannot you envision this humble 'beaten down MAN' simply saying: "I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out."

- This Palm Sunday gospel reading must reflect what the 'Schmidt's on Mission' in Peru are experiencing. More than likely, the Schmidt Family is exposed to a climate where the Divine King has never been heard of or rejected by those who have been controlled by the cartels and other evil forces. Yet, they believe, along with us, that if we keep silent 'the stones will cry out.'

Dear Padre,

How should we dispose of last year's palms?

E very year on Passion Sunday (Palm Sunday), palm branches are handed out and blessed as a powerful reminder of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.

We keep palm branches for two reasons. First, they symbolize our desire to accompany Christ through Holy Week. Second, they symbolize Jesus' desire to enter our homes and accompany us on our journey as we face our own Good Fridays. Taking the palms home and placing them behind a crucifix or holy picture is a powerful reminder of that.

Many parishes ask their members to bring the palm branches they received the previous year to church on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. These



branches are burned to make the ashes that are distributed on Ash Wednesday. After a time, palm branches get brittle and break easily, so if your church doesn't collect them, it's OK to break the palms up and burn them yourself.

The number of palm branches we have in our homes isn't important. Palms and other articles of devotion such as medals and scapulars don't

bring good luck or wealth, and we shouldn't try to use them in that way. We should use them to remind us of the goodness of God and the salvation Christ brings us.
