Happy Sunday!

First, I want to say thank you for the kindness you have all shown me in many ways during my first couple of days at Saint John and Blessed Trinity! It means a lot to me.

As I'm sure you've already heard lots of talk about the Supreme Court's decision regarding the Dobbs case and Roe v. Wade. Here is Archbishop Listecki's statement, which I fully-heartedly support:

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you." (Jeremiah 1:5)

As a Church that advances the Culture of Life and as members of a civil society, we welcome the decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in the Dobbs case.

While no doubt we all feel a renewed hope for the future, let us also remember that our struggle to preserve the sanctity of human life is only just beginning. Abortion laws now return to the individual states. Our challenge is to continue to promote that human life begins at conception and needs to be protected at all times.

The Church will continue to support all women — especially those experiencing unplanned pregnancies where abortion seems like the only or easy solution — by providing the spiritual, emotional and financial support necessary through our parishes, support networks and pregnancy centers.

il appeal to all in our society to work together to make the thought of abortion not only unthinkable, but also unnecessary.

More than 63 million children lost their lives to the scourge of abortion. May their souls, and all the souls of the faithful departed, rest in peace."

On another topic, the US Bishops have announced a Eucharistic Revival, a three-year celebration and focus on teaching on the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

In some way, all of today's readings deal with people who know that they are of God. While the cost of discipleship is high, they, like our psalm response, cry out to God with joy! (Ps. 66) Last week, our Religious Education program sponsored Sr. Mary Teresa at our first "Class before Mass." Her talk was titled "Christianity in 60 minutes" (since that was the length of our class!). She explained a lot about our faith, told many stories and had a lot of great slides, but perhaps the greatest point was her recalling the most important decision of her life. Rather than answering her



vocational call, it was her decision to earnestly pray daily! This begs the question, how is your prayer life? The best definition that I have heard for prayer is one by Dr. Ralph Martin that simply says it means to "pay attention." By slowing down and taking the time to notice God in ALL things, our life truly does become a prayer. We learn God's will by spending time in His presence. The key to knowing God's heart is to have a living, loving relationship with Him. A personal relationship. For years, I have said that another way to spell "love" is T-I-M-E. In today's Gospel, Jesus' disciples are given their instructions for ministry. We are His disciples and here and now, we are all called to serve for "the kingdom of God is at hand." (Lk. 17:20) Prayer is the nerve that moves the hand of God....maybe that is what this line from Luke is really all about. Let's put our hands together in prayer and service of others, for we have much work to do, but God is with us and within us, so be not afraid! See you at Mass.

Summertime Reading: Sharing the Bible with Children:

During these summer months while you are developing the habit of reading many types of stories with children, consider ways to include Bible stories with them as well. Just as we tell and retell family stories from year to year, so too we can and should read and reread Scriptures and pass on these stories from generation to generation. Tales that are found in the Bible help both listeners and readers learn about God's Living Word.



The stories from the Gospels (the New Testament) that are about Jesus are especially appropriate. Many fine Children's Bibles are available, and many of these stories have been adapted for children in storybook formats. (These books make good gifts for young children and those who are older as well.)

When reading these stories, be sure that children know they came from the Bible, God's Holy Book. Keeping a Bible in your home and showing reverence for God's word as you handle it and as you speak the words of Scripture will also help children understand the importance of God's Word.

Parents and others who read Bible stories to and with children can also help them appreciate God's mercy and love and learn more about the life that Jesus lived here on earth. In addition, many of the stories and people in the Bible are interesting and exciting, and children enjoy hearing or reading about their adventures and their accomplishments.

When you have finished reading a Bible story, take a few minutes to talk about it with your children. You might make connections between your family's experiences and those of the people in the Bible or talk about with it might have been like to be a person in the story. Another way to reflect on the story is to ask your children to retell it to you in their own words. In addition, craft projects or artwork using the story themes can be good follow-up activities for rainy days or quiet times. You can find many creative, age-appropriate suggestions on-line. If you begin doing this in July, your children will have a better understanding of some of the contents of the Bible by the time school begins again. An accomplishment in and of itself!

May you, your family, and your loved ones enjoy this Holiday Weekend. As we celebrate this Independence Day, we thank God for all that has been achieved and ask God's help and guidance as we work to accomplish all that remains to be done.



Dear Padre,

Why should I have my baby baptized?

S ome parents pondering baptism say a child should mature first, then choose his or her religion. Yet, parents make many choices for their children—including name, diet, bedtime, and education. To forgo baptism means to choose a nonreligious outlook on life for your child. Indeed, objection to baptism can be a veiled statement about the parents' disregard for religion.

Baptism confers many benefits. First, it cleanses the soul of original sin. Scripture says Adam and Eve relinquished their God-centeredness, instead adopting a self-centered attitude. They thought of themselves as the center



of the universe. Such self-delusion is the origin of all sins. Baptism reverses this, with God telling the child he is loved and regarding him like his own Son, Jesus. Baptismal waters immerse the child into the depths of God's love.

Second, baptism begins a new life of loving response to God's love. Of course,

infants don't understand this during baptism. Children learn it from religious training and their parents' example. The sacraments aid us in living this life of love, especially the Eucharist in which Christ comes to us as bread and wine to nourish us with his love. As parents give a child her very existence, through baptism they set her on course toward eternal life.

Finally, baptism makes the recipient a member of Christ's body, the Church. The child, along with other Church members and guided by ordained pastors, will speak for Christ in society. What parent doesn't want the best for his or her child? Through baptism, God also wants the best for them.
