From Father Schmeckel:

This week we celebrate the Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene on July 22. In 2016, Pope Francis raised this feast day from a "Memorial" to a "Feast" – which is the technical language that gives this feast a little more pomp and circumstance. The Gospel of the Mass for her feast day is one of the Resurrection stories in John's Gospel. He recounts that on Easter Sunday, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb early in the morning. After she finds the tomb empty, she runs to tell the disciples. Later the risen Jesus Himself appears to her and speaks words of comfort and reassurance that her faith was not in vain. Two things for us to consider this week as we

celebrate this feast day.

First, we consider that St. Mary Magdalene is the "apostolorum apostola", as St. Thomas Aquinas calls her. She is the "Apostle to the Apostles." Mary Magdalene is the woman that announces the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead to the other apostles. She is quick to believe, even though the Apostles themselves are not quite sure about everything yet. His closest disciples are slow to believe, but Mary stays at the tomb with her great love for Jesus. As we think of this Apostle to the Apostles, it is important to ask, "Who are we apostles to?" Who are we bringing the Good News of Jesus to in our daily lives? Do we proclaim our love for Jesus through our words and actions? In our workplaces, schools, homes, and anywhere we go?

Second, we consider the encounter between Jesus and Mary Magdalene. When she first sees Him, she doesn't completely recognize Him. This is probably because Jesus' body in all its glory after the Resurrection looked different. When does she come to recognize Him? When He calls her by name. When He says "Mary" – she knows that it is Jesus. Are we listening carefully for Jesus to call us by name? Do we have a habit of listening and speaking to Jesus through a daily life of prayer so that we recognize His Voice? If we do not pray, if we do not have a habit of hearing Him, we are going to have a difficult time hearing Him speak to us over the rabble of the world and all its complexities. Today, we should resolve, like Mary Magdalene, to spend time with Jesus so that we know, love, and listen to his voice when calls us by our names.

Saint Mary Magdalene, pray for us!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Today's readings give us examples of hospitality and reverence for one another. In our first reading from Genesis, we hear the story of Abraham (and Sarah) entertaining three guests. Some scripture scholars muse that this represents the Trinity in the Old Testament, perhaps....but we can learn from Abraham how to treat others, who are made in the image and likeness of God. We see that he gave



them his full attention; he bowed down and was humble; he offered them the best that he had, and he waited on them. These are lessons that we can imitate when we encounter God at Mass and in the Eucharist, as well as with one another. In the Gospel, we hear the story of Mary and Martha. Here too, some scripture scholars present Mary as the contemplative, receptive listener, while Martha is the active, busy, service-minded one. Neither one is better than the other, for our Eucharist encourages us to not only hear God's word but also to act on it. My Dad used to say "there are no strangers in the world, only friends we haven't met." This attitude changes how we treat people and how we gain confidence to visit and get to know others wherever we go in life. With this gift of hospitality and reverence for others, we may experience what is written in Hebrews 13:2 that says "do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing, some people have entertained angels without knowing it." Dear Padre,

Especially in the summertime, parishioners come to Mass dressed quite casually. Some wear shorts, sandals, old jeans, or gym shoes. What is proper church attire?

hen I was a child, my father always wore a dress shirt and tie to church, my mother wore a dress, and my eight siblings and I were also impeccably dressed. Times have changed. We're a more casual society. That said, I think it's good for people to dress up for Mass. Parents need to set an example for their children and get into the habit of wearing their "Sunday best"—even if it's Saturday evening.

The Church, being universal, doesn't have an official dress code.



"Appropriate attire" for the jungles of Brazil is different from that in New York City. We must be sensitive to culture and to financial situations. Also, what is inappropriate for Easter Sunday may be fine for a Saturday teen Mass.

Although not a mandate, in 2006 the US bishops issued a statement with suggestions for Mass attire: "As Christians we should dress in a modest manner, wearing clothes that reflect our reverence for God and that manifest our respect for the dignity of the liturgy and for one another" ("Happy Are Those Who Are Called to His Supper").

We should speak up when someone is dressed inappropriately, but do so in a kind,

nonjudgmental manner. A sign in the back of church or an announcement in the bulletin may be a better alternative. Try something like, "Summer is here, but remember when you dress for Mass that church isn't the beach." We show respect at church events by our participation and in the way we dress.
