From Father Schmeckel:

You may have heard that the United States Catholic Bishops have called for a **Eucharistic Revival**. In doing so, they are calling upon all Catholics to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist – through the Mass, through Eucharistic adoration, and other devotions to the Real Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Surveys have shown that an alarming number of Catholics do not believe what the Church professes to be true about the Eucharist; equally alarming is the number of Catholics who do not even know what the Church teaches about the Eucharist.

This Eucharistic Revival, a three-year movement, is partly a response to this. It will help **set our hearts on fire with love for the Eucharist**. Set us on fire to bring the Good News of Jesus, His Presence, and the Eucharist into the world. During these next three years, we will have a renewed focus on the Mass in our catechesis (religious education) and formation at all age levels. There are lots of opportunities for our parishes to connect with this movement! More information to come.

As we look forward to growing in our love of Jesus in the Eucharist and at Mass, I'd like to share a little of my personal story about how Mass and Eucharistic adoration impacted my vocation as a priest. I did not grow up in a very Catholic family, but my grandmother especially impressed the faith upon me from my earliest years. When I was in college, however, I very quickly found myself attending Mass every day of the week. I'm not sure how it happened, but it did. Every day, I had those 30 minutes to take a break from school and work, stop from all the worries and cares, and be with God. To this day, I am convinced that receiving Jesus in the Eucharist day in and day out for those years was essential to realizing God's love for me. After seeing me at Mass every day, my pastor in college first invited me to consider the priesthood. What a road the Eucharist has taken me down!

Throughout all the many changes in my own life and in the world, I look back and realize that the Eucharist remains the same. In college, in seminary, and as a priest, spending an hour in adoration every day has been the hallmark of perseverance through highs and lows, good times and bad.

Imagine what Jesus can do in our lives if we spend a few minutes with Him every week in the Blessed Sacrament!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Today's readings on this 17th Sunday of Ordinary Time are some of my favorites. The one from Genesis, where Abraham bargains with God is a wonderful example of dialogue! In fact, did you know that the Greek origin of "dialogue" comes from "dia" meaning "through" and "logos" meaning "word/reason/order/God" so truly dialogue can be a "flow of meaning" or "through God!" So we see Abraham pleading with God



to spare the innocent. In the Gospel, we see Luke's version of the "Our Father" where Jesus teaches his disciples to pray by asking. Oftentimes I am guilty of limiting God. However, one Lent, many years ago, I decided to "ask big!" To me this stood for "Ask=Ask, Seek, Knock" and "Big=Believe In God." This deep down, confident belief that God is God and I am not, changed everything! Now I know more than ever, that God is in charge and that He loves me and so, like Blessed Solanus Casey, I thank Him in advance for all of the many ways that He blesses my life! Thomas Merton, a 20th century Trappist monk said that "prayer is not only dialogue with God: it is the communion of our freedom with God's ultimate freedom, God's infinite spirit." And finally, there is a quote from Blessed Fulton Sheen that says, "You were made for perfect happiness. That is your purpose. No wonder everything short of God disappoints you." Don't believe this? Go and ask God! Then prepare to be amazed, for He is "our Father" who loves and cares for His children! See you at Mass.

God of love, We thank you for our wonderful Grandparents and Senior adults who touch our lives. They bring such joy and happiness. Thank you for all the special times that we have with them. Please watch over them, protect them and care for them now. May they know your goodness and love always. Amen



My good friend is converting to Catholicism and learning things that I, a cradle Catholic, never knew. Why wasn't I taught these things? I'm embarrassed that a convert knows more than me.

C atholics receive most of their religious education as children. Even at the high school level, teachers are not able to explore religious topics with the same breadth and depth that occurs during the Order of Christian

Initiation of Adults (OCIA) formerly known as RCIA. The Bible, for instance, is taught to children as stories, but adult faith requires us to read and understand Scripture as more than a story.

Adults learn differently from children; adults ask different questions. The facts and contents remain the same, but it's not



possible for your early religious education to have the same content and depth as that of an adult who is converting to Catholicism.

Most Catholic parishes need a faith-formation program for adults who want to take their faith to a deeper level. If yours doesn't offer adult-education programs, many publishers offer programs that can be used for individual study. Let your own interest and curiosity be your guide.
