

August 4 is the Memorial of **Saint John Vianney**, the patron saint of parish priests. He was a French priest in the 1800s. He often struggled with studying theology, scripture, Latin and the other courses in his seminary education, but he persevered and was eventually ordained a priest. He was sent to a tiny town in France. It was said that the Bishop sent him there because it was a tiny town in nowhere France and John Vianney "couldn't do too much harm there." Not only did this holy priest not cause any harm, but he turned the little town upside down by his holiness. He gave such good counsel in

confession and spiritual direction that people would travel from all over Europe and wait in line for eight to twelve hours to have their confessions heard by this little country priest. As we celebrate this feast day, it is an important reminder that **we want holy priests**. Instinctively, we know when we meet a holy priest that he is in love with Jesus, and we naturally desire more priests like that. It is also a reminder to pray for the priests in your life! Pray for the priest who baptized you; pray for the priest who gave you your first Holy Communion; pray for the priest who heard your last confession; pray for the priest who will, one day far in the future, anoint you and bring you Holy Communion on your death bed. We want and need holy priests to help us find our way to Jesus.

On August 5, we celebrate the **dedication of the Basilica of Saint Mary Major** in Rome. This is a celebration of the birthday of a building, of a specific church in Rome. This might seem like a strange thing. Why do we celebrate this? While we sometimes hear that the brick-and-mortar church is not the most important (which is true), it is still very important. This specific church building dates back to the 400s and is one of the oldest churches dedicated to Mary, Mother of God. When one thinks of what those walls have witnessed in the course of 1500 years, it is outstanding. How many baptisms, Masses, funerals, weddings have been celebrated there? How many saints and sinners and maybe even heretics have wondered in and out of that beautiful building? How many times have everyday people of Rome wandered into that Church, just to sit and rest from the day's toils for a few moments? Physical church buildings are important reminders of how faith becomes real in our day to day lives. Today, we thank God for the Basilica of Saint Mary Major, and we also thank Him that we have beautiful and noble places to encounter God in our two parishes as well!

Finally, on August 6, we will celebrate the **Transfiguration of the Lord**, when Jesus took Peter, James, and John up a mountain to pray. There they have a heavenly and mystical experience of Jesus. Jesus gives them a glimpse of what He looks like in all his glory in heaven. In the Gospel of the Mass today, we hear that Peter is profoundly overwhelmed by this. It is also one of those times when we hear Peter just start talking without thinking. Still, I think he says something important for us to ponder. He says, "Master, it is good to be here." We, too, should say to Jesus, "It is good to be here with you." **How can you find time to stay with Jesus in the week ahead?**

Helping Children to Pray

One of the most powerful thing parents and others can do for children is to help them to pray, and to give them the opportunity to develop a close relationship with God. There are a variety of ways to do this, and it's never too late. Here are some ideas:

- 1. **Introduce common prayers.** Start with a simple prayer. Even children younger than three years old can begin to learn the Sign of the Cross. Children who are a bit older can learn the Hail Mary and the Our Father, the prayer that specifically teaches how to show respect, request daily needs, and ask for forgiveness and protection.
- 2. **Teach gratitude.** Jared Dees, catechetical minister and creator of a website for religious educators says, "To teach the spirit of gratitude to children, ask children to share one thing they are thankful for at dinnertime. It will help them develop a spiritual life."
- 3. **Teach children to listen.** Teach children how to be still and recognize God's answers to prayers. This involves follow-up. If children pray for something, make sure you talk about whether or not they get what was prayed for. If that happens, teach them to say a prayer of thanks. If it doesn't, talk about how that can be an answer to prayer, too
- 4. **Encourage children to keep a prayer journal.** In it, they can write favorite thoughts or prayers, draw pictures of themselves talking to God, or illustrate the gifts God has given them for which they are thankful.
- 5. **Get out of your comfort zone.** If there's something you've been wanting to do but have been nervous about or haven't made time for, such as joining the choir, becoming a lector at Mass, or praying together as a family, do it. You'll be showing children that God comes first as you lead by example.
- 6. **Have realistic expectations.** Don't expect young children to pray for world peace. That may be too big of a concept for many to understand. Simply encourage children to pray for little issues that are relevant to them and don't ask for anything more. As they grow, so will their worldview and their prayers.
- 7. **Create a family prayer.** Let children compose the words to a daily prayer that can be said together. This will help them to see that prayers can be in traditional forms (The Lord's Prayer) or in their own words.

Prayer should be a daily part of our lives and the lives of our children as well. Once you know which methods of prayer will work best with your children and for your family as a whole, keep doing it. It will enrich their lives and strengthen their faith, and yours!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Today as we celebrate the 18th Sunday of Ordinary Time, let us recall the First Commandment that states "I am the Lord, your God. You shall not have false gods before me." (Ex. 20:1-3) and how this relates to today's readings at Mass. In our Gospel from Luke, Jesus ends His parable by urging his followers to become "rich in what matters to God." (Lk.12:21). What matters to God? It is not how much or little we may



possess, but how much or how little we are possessed by our possessions! If I had to describe our Catholic faith in just one word, I would say it is "freedom!" Now many might disagree because we have such things as the Ten Commandments and the moral authority and teaching of our Catholic faith, but it is precisely because "God is Love" (1Jn4:4) that we must be free in order to give and receive love. So, what matters to God is the degree to which we are free to dedicate our time, talent and treasures to loving and caring for others. In reality, we are not to be possessed by our possessions, but rather to know that God is the giver of all good gifts (James 1:17).

Dear Padre,

The new priest assigned to our parish seldom shakes hands at the sign of peace during Mass. Isn't he supposed to?

You may be surprised to know that the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (154) calls for the priest to remain in the sanctuary at the sign of peace to avoid disrupting the assembly's exchange. He

has the option of exchanging a sign of peace with the ministers—it's optional because to do so repeats the first greeting of peace he just extended to everyone in the assembly.

In the United States, an exception is made for special occasions such as weddings, funerals, or when community leaders are present. In those cases, the *GIRM* allows the priest to offer the sign of peace to people sitting near the sanctuary.

Ironically, many parishioners view the presider's participation less as a distortion of the rite than as a positive indicator of their priest's social skills, as in "Father is such a people person!"
