From Father Schmeckel:

On This week, we celebrate the **Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary** (August 15). We celebrate that, at the end of her earthly life, the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken up into heaven, body and soul.

In the Preface of the Mass, we will hear the priest say, "rightly you would not allow her to suffer the corruption of the tomb..." When you and I die, our corpses will begin to decompose and return to some more basic organic elements. God, in his great love for his Mother would not allow her to suffer this.

She is spared from the grimness of the tomb. Often, writers will not refer to the end of Mary's earthly life as her death, but as her "falling asleep in the Lord".

Why does Mary not have to endure what is common to all the rest of us? The Preface from the Mass continues and gives us an answer, "since from her own body she marvelously brought forth your incarnate Son, the Author of all life." Because Mary conceived and gave birth to Jesus, her material body has a closeness and intimacy with God. Her physical reality has a unique beauty because of her closeness to the Source of all life.

This is an important reminder for us as well. Each time we receive Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist, we become physically and spiritually close to Him. And this closeness with Jesus' Body and Blood has consequences! It means that how we use and care for our physical bodies matters. The bodies that God gave us must be cared for and respected – as well as those of others. This celebration of the Assumption reminds us again of the wondrous gift of our bodies. Finally, the Assumption is a sign and promise of Heaven. God has already fulfilled in Mary what He desires to do in each of us. Mary is already fully united – body and soul – in Heaven with the Blessed Trinity. Already Mary is joined in a perfect way to God. The Assumption reminds us that God desires for us to be with Him in Heaven. He desires to bring us into his own divine life. It calls us to pursue a life of virtue and holiness so that one day you and I may join Mary's song of praise in Heaven!

Mary, Queen assumed into Heaven, pray for us!

Because the Assumption falls on a Monday this year, it is <u>not</u> a Holy Day of Obligation, however, there will still be Mass at 6:45 AM at St John. Let us ask Mary to help us praise and adore our Lord!





Why is it Important to Pray the Rosary?

The rosary is a form of meditative prayer. It's a reflection on the life, ministry, and death of Jesus and of His Blessed Mother. Praying the rosary has been a tradition in the Church for a long time. It begins with the recitation of the Apostle's Creed, an Our Father, three Hail Mary's and a Glory Be. Then there are five decades which each begin and end with an Our Father and Glory Be,. There are ten Hail Mary's in between.





If you have children any time is a good time to introduce them to the Rosary and to teach them how to pray, and any age is a good age for them to learn as well! Teaching children to pray requires patience and a lot of repetition. You can choose a specific day of the week to pray with them, or you can simply start with a Hail Mary each day. Once you are consistently gathering to pray, try one decade a day or even a decade or two once a week. Only move to a full rosary when you know that your children will be able to handle it, and always stay flexible! It really depends on the ages of your children and how easily you think it'll be to make praying the rosary a habit in your home.

Some reasons for teaching children the Rosary:

- 1. They learn their prayers.
- 2. It builds community and family togetherness.
- 3. It teaches children to be quiet and to listen.
- 4. When children know and think about the Mysteries of the Rosary, it helps them learn about and remember Scripture stories/events.
- 5. It's an important tradition in our Catholic Faith.
- 6. The more children see family members and others pray, and can join in, the more likely they will be to continue praying themselves.

Saying the Rosary can help all of us, adults and children, to slow down be quiet, center ourselves and focus on God. May these summer days bring us some time and some opportunities to do this!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Today on the 20th Sunday of Ordinary Times, we are met with difficult readings, where the prophet Jeremiah is thrown into a well to die and Jesus tells His disciples that "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!" (Lk 12:49). Indeed, make no mistake, we have a very demanding faith, but be not afraid, for God, like a loving Father, always



provides for us, like it says in today's Psalm 40...."the Lord comes to my aid...and the Lord hears my cry!" Also, in our reading from Hebrews 12:1, we know that we are "surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses" which many scholars believe to be our vast communion of Saints! In fact, if today was not a Sunday, our Saint for Aug. 14 is Maximilian Kolbe. He was a Franciscan priest from Poland, who lived in the 20th century and was a pioneer in spreading the faith through media! He began a "Militia Immaculata" for, like many Saints before him, he believed that the surest shortcut to Jesus was through his Blessed Mother, Mary! He printed magazines and gave retreats to bring people to the saving knowledge of Christ, ultimately being arrested by the Gestapo and sent to Auschwitz during World War II, where he earned a martyr's crown by dying in place of another man! He loved God, his mother Mary and the Church so much, that in imitation of Christ, he was willing to "lay down his life for a friend." (John 15:13)

Tomorrow, on August 15, our universal Church celebrates the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary! If possible, please try to get to Mass (check out masstimes.org) and/or say a rosary, since life and faith can be demanding, but we know we march FROM victory, not FOR victory, and so when we commit to this journey of faith, we will find peace, courage and JOY that only God can give! See you at Mass.





Dear Padre,

A friend told me not to worry about salvation because we're predestined to be saved or condemned. Why try to be a good person if God has already decided where I'll end up?

The idea that some people are predestined to be saved and others are damned is contrary to Catholic teaching.

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* says that "when therefore [God] establishes his eternal plan of 'predestination,' he *includes in it each person's free response to his grace*" (600; emphasis added).

The *Catechism* (1038) also cites the parable of the separation of the sheep from the goats, in which the sheep and goats are separated not randomly, but based on their actions: "When the Son of Man comes in his glory...all the nations will be assembled before him. And he will separate them one from another, as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father'....And [those on the left] will go off to eternal punishment" (Matthew 25:31–46).

God wants to save all people. The way we respond to God's gift of salvation is called *free will*. Unfortunately, not everyone accepts that gift.
