

### From Father Schmeckel:

As you may have already noticed, I almost exclusively use a somewhat longer Eucharistic Prayer at Mass. This is called Eucharistic Prayer I or the Roman Canon. There are many reasons that I choose to use this option for our prayer. In the next couple of weeks, I want to look at the words of this prayer and help us to grow in how we pray at Mass.



After we sing the Holy, Holy, Holy, the Priest begins: To you, therefore, most merciful Father, we make humble prayer and petition through Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord.

All of our prayer is directed to God through his Son, Jesus, and under the direction of the Holy Spirit. Especially in the celebration of the Mass, we don't just wander around aimlessly. We look at God. This is why both of our churches, St. John Evangelist and Blessed Trinity, have as their main focus the altar and the cross. Anyone who walks into either of our churches immediately has his or her attention drawn to a singular place through the layout and the structure of our buildings. Similarly, at Mass the Priest's first words in the Eucharist Prayer remind us that this is not about us. It is first and foremost about God. We don't come to Mass primarily to feel good about ourselves and to see our friends (though this can be good when it happens, too!). We come to Mass because we love God and want to grow in our love for Him.

### The Priest continues:

"...that you accept and bless these gifts, these offerings, these holy and unblemished sacrifices..."

As the Priest blesses the bread and wine that will soon become the Body and Blood of Jesus, we should think about the gifts, offerings, and sacrifices that we bring to God at Mass. Maybe we gave some money at the offertory time to help maintain our church building and to educate our children. Maybe things are difficult for us right now, and so we gave God our smile and cheerful greeting as we walked into Church. Maybe we sacrificed going to a basketball tournament or hanging out with friends or an extra hour of sleep to come to Mass. As the Priest blesses the bread and wine, we ask Jesus to bless the gifts, offerings, and sacrifices that we brought to Him today. What gift will you bring to Jesus at Mass?

Our prayer at Mass continues by asking God to pour out his graces on all kinds of people: the Church, those gathered at Mass, the living, the dead. Essentially for everyone, everywhere – even across the expanse of time. We will continue to look at this next week. In the meantime, let us listen carefully at Mass to the words of the Eucharistic Prayer and ask the Holy Spirit to help us to pray well.

### The Power of Family Rituals

Rituals are part of life — everyday life, family life and our Catholic faith life. They nourish us, ground us, comfort us, and teach us. In her book Mea Cox (The Heart of a Family: Random House) said that when people are asked to Grodescribe their family to someone else, rituals are often the first things mentioned. They create a feeling of belonging to a family and not just living



Faith

Even with hectic schedules, it's easy for families to grow in faith together by celebrating the sacred in simple routine activities. Here are some ways to do that:

- 1. Teach your children to start each day with prayers. Put a positive "thought for the day" calendar on your breakfast table.
- 2. Celebrate special saints' feast days or ethnic holidays and feasts.
- 3. Make birthdays special. Celebrating a child's birth is a central way to convey a sense of one's sacredness. Find a time to sit together with your child and share a special message just from you. It might be about the day he or she was born, about how much you were looking forward to having this child, or mention traits of this child that bring you joy.
- 4. Commemorate Anniversaries of Baptism and/or First Eucharist with a special candle at dinner, a favorite dessert, or with a visit to church to pray and light a candle.
- 5. Make more of your time in the car together. Instead of asking lots of questions ask something simple such as, "Have you got any guestions on your mind?" Then listen. The more listening you do, the more you'll find out, and the closer you may become to your children.
- 6. Celebrate the night before the first day of school. Set aside some time on the night before school begins to gather and have everyone tell at least one good memory from the previous school year about themselves or about the family. This is a chance to solidify connections and gather strength before beginning the adventure of a new school year.
- 7. Bedtime can often be a special time. The actual look of the bedtime ritual will vary from family to family, but peacefulness and closure to the day will bring much to everyone's life. Asking children questions like:

What were you happy about today?

If you had today to do over, is there anything you would do differently?

Is there anything you need help with?

These questions can then lead to prayers and a recognition of God's presence.

Research shows that families with meaningful rituals have children who do better academically and socially, so there is no better time to start a family ritual that can deepen your relationships, create lasting memories, and strengthen your faith as well!

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Our readings today focus on the theme of salvation and our call as disciples. Pay attention to the Collect, the prayer said by Father at the beginning of Mass, just before the First reading is proclaimed. It contains the essence of how we are to receive and respond to the "good news." It says, "O God, who cause the minds



of the faithful to unite in a single purpose, grant your people to love what you command and to desire what you promise, that, amid the uncertainties of this world, our hearts may be fixed on that place where true gladness is found. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen." Just like Luke reminds us in today's Gospel, that we should strive to enter through the narrow gate, our faith journey must be focused and steadfast, as we struggle daily to follow the Lord. As we look forward to our coming year of Religious Education, we desire to pass on our faith to others, recognizing that it can be a challenge with our increasingly overstimulated; disengaged and screen-obsessed culture, i.e. young people.

Here are some tips from Mark Hart, "the Bible Geek" who is a 27-year veteran of youth ministry:

- Time is more important than teaching points.
- You show teens who God is through how you live your faith: the reverence with which you receive Jesus in the Eucharist; the time you spend in prayer; the way you treat others-all of your actions will speak louder than words as your faith life will show them the "who" that is the source of the "what."
- Be a consistent example of worship. Bring your kids to Mass whether they want to go or not, whether on vacation or not. Put Jesus first and build your life around Him. Actions follow beliefs.
- Sit in the front at Church. Kids are easily distracted, so the nearer to the altar, the areater the sensory experience of the Mass. Sing and pray the responses. Like anything, we get out what we put in.
- Say family prayers at meals and before bed. Pray a family rosary one day a week, connect it all to Scripture.
- Realize that we go to Mass to receive and not to get. We go to give our time, praise, adoration, and thanks!
- Keep learning. A true disciple is an eternal student. Ask the Lord to give you a spirit of wisdom, trust, and JOY, bearing in mind, that without God, we can do nothing! Then like our Psalm today says, "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News, for steadfast is His kindness toward us, and the fidelity of the Lord endures forever." See you at Mass.

# Dear Padre,

# I have some views that differ from the Church's stance. Must all my beliefs align with the Church?

The answer to this question is difficult without knowing your specific views. Generally speaking, Catholics affirm a deposit of faith that the Church has received and is bound to preserve. This includes the public revelation of God manifest in the incarnate Word of God (Jesus Christ)

and preserved in the sacred Scriptures and apostolic Tradition. This deposit of faith ended with the death of the last apostle.

The deposit of faith entrusted to the Church is not simply a set of propositional truths, but is bound up in the person of Jesus Christ, who is the fullness of God's revelation

to humanity. Catholics commonly agree on certain teachings central to the deposit of faith and taught by Church authority, including the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the role of the sacraments, and creeds formulated by ancient councils. (Catholics are not required to believe in many of the private revelations and visions that have accumulated over the centuries.)

Since the mid-1800s, theologians and Church leaders have debated the infallible nature of documents issued by popes and the Vatican and the extent to which they're binding on Catholics. All agree, however, that these documents should be given the utmost consideration. Those who disagree with the Church on faith or moral issues should investigate the reasons for specific teachings. When they realize that God's laws and moral teachings begin with the dignity of the person, they may conform their views to God's truth which the Church wishes to convey and uphold.
