### From Father Schmeckel:

During the past few weeks, we have been looking at the First Eucharistic Prayer, often called the Roman Canon. This is one option for the most important part of the Mass – when the bread and wine offered on the altar become the Body and Blood of Jesus. So far, we have seen (1) that all of our prayer and attention is directed to God and (2) the need to pray for the Church – throughout the world and here in our own backyard. Today, we move to a section of the prayer called the "Commemoration of the Living". It is my hope that by reflecting on the words and the actions of the Mass, we can all grow in our full participation in the prayer of the Church.



In the "Commemoration of the Living", we do just what it sounds like. We pray for living people. The priest prays:

"...Remember, Lord, your servants N. and N...."

Sometimes, I will say the names of people, but often our Mass intentions are for those who are deceased (which comes later in the prayer). The instructions for priests say that he is supposed to join his hands and pray briefly for those for whom he intends to pray. This is one of the parts of the Mass where it becomes quiet for a few moments. What should we do in the first little moment of quiet? **Pray for the living people you know who need God's help and grace**. This could be your grandmother who is sick, your friend who is dealing with depression and financial difficulties, or maybe it's for you and help with a difficult test or presentation that you have in the upcoming week. The priest then continues the prayer:

"...and all gathered here, whose faith and devotion are known to you. For them, we offer you this sacrifice of praise or they offer it for themselves and all who are dear to them..."

For our consideration here, I want to focus on the line "...we offer you this sacrifice of praise." What does this mean to offer a "sacrifice of praise". Often times, when we choose to be at Mass and worship God, we sacrifice that hour that we could spend doing something else. Our decision to be at Mass is a sacrifice. We give up our own thoughts to pay careful attention to the words, gestures, and music of the Mass. Maybe as you grow older, the reality of coming to church means giving up your physical comfort and ease – this, too, is a sacrifice that you make to be there. Perhaps, you give a monetary gift at the offertory that could be used to purchase everyday needs and wants. These are sacrifices of praise that we make at each and every Mass. On the way to Mass, may I suggest that you and your family ask each other and talk about this question: What sacrifice have you made to come to Mass today? What sacrifice can you make this week to praise God in your daily life?

Now, for a few practical and administrative updates:

As you may have heard, St John's will be participating in the **Archdiocesan Love One Another Capital Campaign** beginning in January 2023. This is the Archbishop's initiative to help bring life into both the local Church throughout the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and in our own parish. I am looking forward to the possibilities that the capital campaign will give us to evangelize and catechize the young people of our parish family, teach and learn how to pray, and care for our buildings and facilities that help us to announce the Good News of Jesus Christ! While we can't do everything, if you see an opportunity, need or concern in our parish, I am always willing to listen and hear good ideas! More information about the Love One Another campaign will be coming as we get closer to January.

# September Days...

Now that the Labor Day weekend is here and the first days of school are over, September is a perfect time to discover the extraordinary ways our Catholic faith gives meaning and purpose to our lives. Here are some ways for families, and for all of us, to do that:

# **Help Other People**

The feast day of one of our newest saints, Mother Teresa, who served the needs of the poor on the streets of Calcutta in India is this Monday. This is a great time for

the entire family to begin doing something special for those who are less fortunate. Create a Caring and Sharing Box in which family members can place clothing, toys, coins, or other possessions that they want to share with others. Empty the box on a regular basis and take your children with you when you donate the items to St. Vincent de Paul or other charitable organizations.

## **Make Mass Extraordinary**

- Decide ahead of time which Mass to attend.
- Set out everyone's clothes so getting ready is not a hassle.
- Sit in front so children can see.
- Bring children to the Communion line even if they are too young to receive.
- Celebrate good behavior by doing something special after Mass.

#### Celebrate the Cross in Your Home

September 14 is a feast day celebrating the Triumph of the Cross of Christ. Make it a point on this feast day to bless your children and let them bless you. Remind your children that they were all anointed with the Sign of the Cross on their forehead when they were baptized. You might want to give family members a small cross to carry in their pockets on this special day as a reminder to pray for help when difficulties arise.

## **Angel Power**

September 29 is the feast day of three important angels called "archangels".

- St. Michael is sometimes called the Prince of Angels. He is a champion of good and leader of God's army. We pray to him to help overcome temptations.
- St. Gabriel is the angel who appeared to Our Lady and asked if she would be the mother of Jesus. We pray to him to help us do God's will in our lives
- St. Raphael is the angel who accompanied a blind man named Tobit on a journey. We pray to him to protect us in our travels.

It's fun to celebrate angels. Remind your children that they each have a guardian angel who was sent by God to watch over them.

### Find God in the Present

We all know people who live their lives looking back at the past. We also know people who are always stressing about the future. Our Catholic faith teaches that God gives us the grace needed to deal with whatever is happening in the present moment, so make it a point this month to look for God in each ordinary moment and help others with whom you live and work to do the same.

With the start of September, we look to the start of school and with that, the start of our Religious Education school year! We are excited to welcome all of our students and their families back from grades 7-12!! Thank you for ALL of your continued prayers and support of our program. Please continue to keep us in your good prayers and especially for our 12th grade students who are preparing to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation on October 2. What a blessing to be united in prayer and love as a family of believers here at St. John Evangelist. During our upcoming year of faith formation, we hope to grow in our prayer life, since that is directly related to our faith. Just as our physical bodies need air to breathe and live and grow, our souls need prayer to breathe and live and grow. As well, during this call to Eucharistic Revival by the U.S. Bishops, we will focus more intently on the amazing gift of Jesus really and truly present in the Eucharist and the powerful encounter of Him at every Mass. Archbishop Fulton Sheen, who grew up in a small town in Illinois, became famous as Archbishop of New York and his Emmy-winning TV show in the 1950's called "Life is Worth Living" and is on his way to Sainthood, described the Mass like this...."Why did our Blessed Lord use bread and wine as the elements of this Memorial? First of all, because no two substances in nature better symbolize unity than bread and wine. As bread is made from a multiplicity of grains of wheat, and wine is made from a multiplicity of grapes, so the many who believe are one in Christ. Second, no two substances in nature have to suffer more to become what they are than bread and wine. Wheat has to pass through the rigors of winter, be ground beneath the Calvary of a mill, and subjected to purging fire before it can become bread. Grapes in their turn must be subjected to the Gethsemane of a wine press and have their life crushed from them to become wine. Thus, do they symbolize the Passion and Sufferings of Christ, and the condition of Salvation, for Our Lord said, unless we die to ourselves, we cannot live in Him." Our hope and prayer in Religious Education each year is not just to "know about" Jesus and His Church, but more importantly, to KNOW Jesus and His Church. monk from the Abbey of Gethsemane in Kentucky, Fr. M. Raymond said "Today's troubles are tomorrow's wheat and wine, for we must make our lives a Mass." Be assured of our thanks and prayers for holding in prayer these precious children of God. # Dear Padre,

# It seems like the Church always asks for money. Why should I donate?

The Church is a global organization representing institutions with growing needs—parishes, schools, charities, and mission societies, for example. If it seems like they "always ask for money," it's because there is a constant need to maintain these services. Indeed, the Vatican donates substantial funds to many charities.

Financial support has always been part of Christian community life. Jesus instructed his apostles to rely on the generosity and hospitality of those to whom they preached (see Luke 10:7). Early Christians gave contributions to the apostles to be distributed among widows and orphans. In fact, the early



Church's charitable activities were so extensive, it led to the formation of the diaconate, with deacons focusing on charitable work while the apostles preached (see Acts 6:1–6).

Some observe that the Church owns splendid churches and artwork. "Why doesn't the Church sell these assets to fund their operations?" they ask. Indeed, as worshipers leave inner-city parishes for the suburbs,

dioceses have tried to sell decommissioned churches. They have discovered that few people can or want to buy a church. As for art treasures, they are part of the Church's patrimony from previous generations that continues to inspire Catholics today and into the future.

Ultimately, we give in charity, recognizing that it's Christ to whom we give when we give to the needy. Almsgiving is part of Christian life because of what it does for the recipient and for what giving does for the giver (see Acts 20:35).
