

From Father Schmeckel:

Last Friday night, I attend **Saint Francis de Sales Seminary's** annual fundraising dinner along with several parish staff members. This year there was a record turnout - nearly 2,000 people in attendance! The event helps to support the seminary's mission of forming new priests to serve in parishes and do all the other things that priests do. Being at the dinner brings back memories of my time in seminary. When I started in the fall of 2014, there were only 25 men living there and studying to be priests. This fall, there are over 80 men in formation – and they're running out of space for bedrooms,



classrooms, and dining rooms! When I talk to the seminarians, I am re-inspired by their zeal, their love for God and His Church, and their joy. The tremendous growth in both numbers and quality is a testament to God's goodness and to the good work happening at the seminary and throughout the Archdiocese. Pray for these men who will, God willing, be our parish priests one day!

At the end of the evening, one of the emcees gave a challenge to all the parishes in the Archdiocese. He challenged every parish in the Archdiocese to send one new seminarian to Saint Francis de Sales Seminary next fall. His challenge is another reminder to **pray and work for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.** Priests, nuns, and brothers do not just magically pop up out of nowhere. They come from families and communities. I extend that challenge to our parishes: Who are the young men and women in our parishes who should be thinking about a vocation to the priesthood or religious life? Have you told them that they would make a good priests or sisters? Do you pray daily for an increase in vocations to the priesthood, consecrated life, holy marriage, and generous single life? If you know of young men or women (in high school or college) that are open to the priesthood or sisterhood, please tell me their names so that I can pray for them or encourage them in any way possible!

In the week ahead, we celebrate an awesome lineup of Saints.

Monday, October 17: Saint Ignatius of Antioch – Bishop and Martyr, who died in 107 and wrote beautifully about the Eucharist.

Tuesday, October 18: Saint Luke the Evangelist – who wrote the third Gospel and tells us a lot about Mary and the birth of Jesus.

Wednesday, October 19: Saints John de Brebeuf, Isaac Jogues, and Companions – Jesuit priests who died excruciating deaths as martyrs while bringing the Gospel to the indigenous people throughout New York and Canada.

Saturday, October 22: Saint John Paul II, the contemporary globe-crossing pope who canonized hundreds of Saints and loved to tell us, "Be not afraid!"

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE GRADES 7 - 12:

Though prayer can be memorized words like those said in the Rosary or at mealtime or in the Divine Mercy chaplet, which are all good and efficacious, prayer truly is just a conversation between us and God. We talk to Him and He listens and He talks to us and we listen. In today's Collect at Mass, the priest says "grant that we may always conform our will to yours" and there is the true essence of prayer! We don't pray to get God to change His mind and do our will, but rather we ask with humility and sincerity of heart for us to trust and obey God's will in every situation, no matter what. I have heard it also said that "prayer is the nerve that moves the hand of God." This too is a good explanation of prayer for we see in today's readings that our persistence and devotion can make a difference since we recited in today's Psalm 121 that "our help is from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." Look back at your own life and in the history of civilization and you will be reminded of God's goodness and intercession in the events of the world and your world! Our focus this year in 7-12th grade Religious Education is on prayer. At the start of our school year, all students and teachers received a prayer journal titled "Every day a holy day" and that is what we are trying to do in and out of class!! Essentially, prayer is all about relationship as we stay in daily communion with God, our Father! St. Teresa of Avila, whose feast day we just celebrated yesterday on October 15, said "you pay God a compliment by asking great things of Him" so ask big!! Dear Padre,

I'm a recovering heroin addict. Do I need to confess my addiction? Addiction is a disease, not a sin, right?

Right, but addiction and using drugs are two different things. As you know, recovering addicts who don't use drugs are still addicts, and that in itself isn't a sin. But it's against the law to use heroin in the United States, so even if you never committed a secondary crime to get it, the "getting it" was a crime.

More important, though, the body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, and it's a sin to abuse ourselves in any way. Even if it weren't against the law, your use of heroin is certainly an abuse of your body.

The sacrament of reconciliation is more than just receiving absolution for sins. It also helps us look more deeply at our lives. Before you go, examine your conscience: Ask yourself how your addiction has affected your body, your life, your relationship with God, and the welfare of others.

If you bring honest answers to those questions as well as an open heart and an open mind, your conversation with your priest at reconciliation will help you heal your relationship with God and others.

You will also receive the grace to improve your life and do things like overcome addiction so you can be a better person.
