We live out these principles by supporting ministries of mercy such as Saint Vincent DePaul and Home Makers of Hope; our clergy through the *Clergy Appreciation Dinner* and donations to our seminarians; *Right to Life Activities* and providing donations to Pro-Life options such as the Knights Women's Center; Veterans at the Hayley VA Center and Warrior's Place in Ruskin; first responders at our annual *Blue Mass*; and those with special needs through the *Special Olympics* and *Tootsie Roll Drives*.

We also are dedicated to service for our parish as we volunteer our time to host barbecues for our graduates and our altar servers; sponsor soccer challenges, free throw competition, and provide scholarships for our Saint Stephen School students; set up the crèches each year at Advent; host a Saint Nicholas Day Pancake Breakfast; and help the Men's Club with the Lenten Fish Fry among other activities.

Develop strong relationships with the clergy - We are blessed to have the strong support of our pastor, our parochial vicar, and our deacons – all of whom are Knights. The Knights may be an independent organization, but service to our parish and our clergy's priorities has to be a priority for us as well. Our Church's priorities are (1) the sacraments, (2) faith formation, and (3) pastoral care, so we too should keep the sacraments and spiritual growth our foremost priorities as we volunteer our service for the pastoral care of our parish.

The Gift of Life

THE TEACHINGS OF HUMANAE VITAE AND ADVANCEMENTS IN THE SCIENCE OF FERTILITY CAN HELP US BUILD A CULTURE OF LIFE

S WE PREPARE to observe the 45th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision, another anniversary comes to mind. July will mark 50 years since Blessed Pope Paul VI's 1968 encyclical, Humanae Vitae, on the regulation of birth.

The legacies of both are related to extraordinary scientific advances that opened up new technological means to control the transmission of human life.

When the Supreme Court revisited Roe in the 1992 Planned Parenthood v. Casey decision, the 5-4 majority argued that Roe could not be overturned because, for two decades, people had made choices about their lives and intimate relationships "in reliance on the availability of abortion in the event that contraception should fail."

Pope Paul had a very different response to such challenges — one that has been described as "Christian personalism." In Humanae Vitae, he wrote this about married love: "Husband and wife become in a way one heart and one soul, and together attain their human fulfillment. It is a love that is total. ... Whoever really loves his partner loves not only for what he receives, but loves that partner for the partner's sake" (9).

Humanae Vitae proclaims that each person is worthy to be loved and respected for his own sake and possesses a dignity that is inviolable. This proclamation is more necessary today than ever as scientific experiments in areas such as artificial intelligence, robotics and genetic manipulation push past boundaries of even the most imaginative science fiction writers.

Pope Francis, in his encyclical Laudato Si', wrote this: "The acceptance of our

bodies as God's gift is vital for welcoming and accepting the entire world as a gift from the Father and our common home, whereas thinking that we enjoy absolute power over our own bodies turns, often subtly, into thinking that we enjoy absolute power over creation" (155).

Science and technology will confront us with new questions about what it means to be human. And the answers will be increasingly difficult as the line between reality and virtual reality is blurred.

Today, as in 1968, Humanae Vitae is an important part of the Church's response. Unfortunately, some will use the occasion of the anniversary to reignite old controversies, but this approach will miss its enduring value.

St. John Paul II promoted Humanae Vitae, though he thought that further explanation was needed for its teachings to gain wider acceptance. That is one reason why he developed a "theology of the body," and why he devoted so much time to it

But already in 1968, natural family planning advocates such as my friends Drs. John and Evelyn Billings welcomed Humanae Vitae and supported its teaching with a natural method of fertility management now known as the Billings Ovulation Method.

Just last year, the European Union certified a new mobile app that uses an algorithm developed by a Nobel Prizewinning physicist to measure a woman's body temperature to accurately predict ovulation. According to one English news source, the app, known as Natural Cycles, "could spell the end for hormonal and intrusive birth control measures."



Such a result would come not a moment too soon. The World Health Organization has classified estrogen-progestogen oral contraceptives as Group 1 carcinogens. That means they are known to be carcinogenic for women, increasing their risk of liver, cervical and breast cancer.

Natural family planning methods encourage women to better understand the delicate natural processes of their bodies. They encourage better communication and respect between husbands and wives.

Perhaps this new "science" of the body will enable a new generation of Catholic spouses to live an authentic theology of the body in their marriages and will help the world rediscover the dignity of human life and love.

ur Order's steadfast defense and promotion of a Culture of Life is grounded on our ultimate assurance that in the natural law written in the heart of every person is the recognition that human life is sacred from its very beginning to its end. In the depths of our consciousness, human intellect knows that the very source of its existence—i.e. human life—ought to be protected and celebrated. In that regard, the message of the Knights of Columbus extends far beyond our Order and our religious creed; it is a universal message that every person of good will can come to affirm.

"Human life is sacred and inviolable at every moment of existence, including the initial phase which precedes birth. All human beings, from their mother's womb, belong to God who searches them and knows them, who forms them and knits them together with His own hands, who gazes on them when they are tiny shapeless embryos and already sees in them the adults of tomorrow whose days are numbered and whose vocation is even now written in the 'book of life.' There too, when they are still in their mothers' womb—as many passages of the Bible bear witness—they are the personal objects of God's loving and fatherly providence." (Evangelium Vitae, 61)

St. John Paul II famously noted that if human life itself is not respected, then respect for all other rights—for example, the right to health, to marriage, to culture, to religion—is "false and illusory." Human rights of every kind are "incomprehensible" without the right to life. Our Order, therefore, joins the universal Church in acknowledging the dignity of human life in its efforts to achieve legal and constitutional protection for every human person at the international, national, state, and local levels.

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all of us the elements of a ministry, and the first one is that our work should flow from a baptismal call to be a Disciple of Jesus. Let's make sure that spirituality is a part of everything we do by beginning with a prayer asking for God's grace in all our endeavors. Individual Knights can grow spiritually by attending business meetings and degree formations — those events are steeped in prayer and reinforce

our spirituality.

A Lenten Reflection

y mother had two sisters and a brother. All were married and gathered at least twice a month to celebrate a birthday, anniversary or a specific holiday. We would all partake of a great meal and, of course, Aunt Helen's apple pie. Afterwards, we children would be escorted outside or into another room so the adults could play "penny poker," have some liquid refreshments and gossip!

Joe, my Aunt Kate's husband, loved Chianti, and as the evening wore on, he would be more forthcoming about how he thought about current topics. At times, Joe would get into my father's face about his devotion to the Catholic church. We were a family of limited means. However, my father attended Mass and gave to the church his time, talent and treasure. Joe would often tell him how foolish he was to support the church, especially when the priests had automobiles, and we could not afford one.

After a few years passed, Joe began to have constant pains in his left shoulder. His doctors could not determine the cause, and my dad referred him to his doctor. At first, the suggestion was ignored, but the pain increased, so Joe went to the medical group dad had recommended. The doctor felt a slight lump under Joe's left shoulder blade and recommended exploratory surgery. The resulting prognosis was terminal cancer, with no more than six months life expectancy. Joe was soon hospitalized at a hospital in the next city. His wife returned to work and would visit in the evenings. My dad, now retired, took the city bus and visited Joe as much as he could. As time went on, they became close, and dad discovered Joe was a fallen away Catholic. He asked Joe if he would like to see a priest, and after looking at my dad, almost with resignation, he said yes. Our parish priest arrived a few days later, and upon leaving the room, he looked at my dad and said in a compassionate tone: "Tell the family Joe has made his peace with the Lord and is ready for his journey home." My Uncle Joe died shortly after his 51st birthday.

The "Hound of Heaven" is a poem written by English poet Francis Thompson (1859-1907). The author was praised by G.K. Chesterton and influenced J.R.R. Tolkien. It is a story of all of us who go after worldly pleasures, ignoring the possibility of their sinful attributes. The deeper we plunge, the stronger grace pulls on us to return to the one who loves us, until at last, we return. I often think of the many years my Uncle Joe spent away from the Church. Yet I'm sure deep down inside he never really left, for the grace of a loving God never gave up on him. We are in the season of Lent when the grace of God calls us to repent and come home. Take some time out of your busy schedule and allocate some quiet time to reflect on the following:

- Search on YouTube for a variety of renderings of the poem, including one reading by Richard Burton.
- Read: The Parable of the Lost Sheep Luke 15: 1-7

A Call to Action

n February 3, the Saint Stephen Parish Pastoral Council hosted a Ministry Workshop to discuss how the various Saint Stephen ministries can help grow the spiritual church over the next 3-5 years.

After Mass and an opening prayer, the Parish Pastoral Council chair, Jack Metz, started the workshop with some interesting facts about our parish: we have over 15,000 registered parishioners (@5,000 families), and in the past year since the opening of the new church, 300 families have joined the parish.

While that's a good trend, we're only seeing 20-25% of our fellow parishioners at Mass each weekend. This workshop focused on what we can do as a ministry to achieve the parish's missions and goals; reach out to those who do not regularly come to church; become a more welcoming church, and evangelize to the greater community.

Father Curtis was the first of many speakers, and he discussed how Jesus calls for us to make other disciples, and how that drives the priorities of our Church – the centrality of the sacraments; the formation of faith; and the pastoral care as demonstrated by charity and other outreaches to those in need. He then talked about the three elements of a ministry and how each of the Saint Stephen ministries should reflect each of these elements. We as Knights should constantly strive to ensure we are acting like a ministry that benefits the members of the parish and adheres to each element of a ministry.

The first element of a ministry is that it "flows from the baptismal call". Are we doing things that make more Disciples of Christ? If not, then we are just another social organization.

The second element of a ministry is that it conducts its business in "cooperation and collaboration with proper pastors". That means that we make use of the Parish Pastoral Council to ensure the Knights' activities are in line with the needs of the

parish and in line with our pastor and Church's priorities: sacraments, faith formation, and pastoral care.

The third element of a ministry includes "formation." Considering the activities of our Council, are we doing them intentionally? Pope Francis said, "Find new ways to spread the word of God to every corner of the world." **Events** like our annual Day of Reflection help us to ensure that we are doing things intentionally and help with the formation of the work we are engaged in for the parish.

S/K Julio Alvarez and Nick Turco, both Parish Pastoral Council members, discussed the Saint Stephen Mission Statement and introduced the goals.

The focus now is in making our parish more welcoming; offering opportunities to grow in our spirituality; addressing the needs of those who come to church regularly, and reaching out to those who do not attend Mass regularly or need help. Building the Domestic Church

FEBRUARY - THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

he foundation of the domestic church is the sacrament of marriage. It is therefore important to reflect often on the mystery and calling of this sacrament. Also, our children may be called to become spouses and parents, so it is important to help them understand the type of love that is necessary in marriage and family life.

Meditation

From a homily by St. John Chrysostom on Marriage and Family Life

How is marriage a mystery? The two have become one. This is not an empty symbol. They have not become the image of anything on earth, but of God Himself. ... They come to be made into one body. See the mystery of love! If the two do not become one, they cannot increase; they can increase only by decreasing! How great is the strength of unity!

From Pope John Paul II's Familiaris Consortio

"The Spirit which the Lord pours forth [in the sacrament of marriage] gives a new heart, and renders man and woman capable of loving one another as Christ has loved us. Conjugal love reaches that fullness to which it is interiorly ordained. conjugal charity, which is the proper and specific way in which the spouses participate in and are called to live the very charity of Christ who gave Himself on the Cross. ... Spouses are therefore the permanent reminder to the Church of what happened on the Cross; they are for one another and for the children witnesses to the salvation in which the sacrament makes them sharers.

"Do we think of marriage differently when we remember that Christ is present in the sacrament of marriage? How does this change or challenge our personal views of love?

"What do we think of St. John Chrysostom's principle of Christian married love — that spouses and family "increase" by "decreasing"? How does



this principle relate to the words that we hear from John the Baptist: "He must increase; I must decrease" (Jn 3:30)?

"Have we loved each family member by sacrificing for them as Christ has done for each of us? In what ways do each of us do this? In what ways could we be better at this?"

Attending a Degree Exemplification

s every Knight of Columbus knows, each of the Order's degree exemplifications teaches a lesson about one of the principles of the Order. In the admissions (First) degree, we learn the lesson of <u>Charity</u>; in the formation (Second) degree, the lesson of <u>Unity</u>; in the Knighthood (Third) degree the lesson of <u>Fraternity</u>; and in the patriotic (Fourth) degree, the lesson of Patriotism.

The first three lessons are so vital to understanding who we are as Knights that a member can only achieve full Knighthood in the Order if he completes the first three degree exemplifications. That is why we strongly encourage every member to strive for full Knighthood in the Order by completing the first three degree exemplifications and becoming a Third Degree Knight. If a member remains a First or Second Degree Knight, he will only receive part of the story and will never fully understand what the Order—and being a Knight of Columbus—is all about.

We should also recognize that repetition usually helps all of us in our learning process. That is why we encourage every member to periodically attend degree exemplifications as an observer after their initial exemplification. Every time we witness a degree exemplification, we learn something new about the Order, whether by picking up a new phrase or sentence that we previously missed, by hearing something significant about the lesson that we have forgotten to put into practice, or by seeing a different interpretation given by a new degree team member. It also never gets tiring watching new candidates receive these lessons for the first time!

Also, the Order revises the content of the degree exemplifications every so often to keep them fresh and enhance the impact of the lessons taught. Our current version of the admissions degree exemplification dates from 2006, but the formation degree exemplification dates from 2016 and Knighthood degree exemplifications dates from 2011 (with some additional revisions in 2014). As those of us on the St. Stephen degree team who have

immersed themselves in exemplification roles can attest, the changes are deeply meaningful, and every single Knight can benefit from seeing and hearing these lessons of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity in a new light.

There are many opportunities for admissions and formation degree exemplifications. At St. Stephen, we conduct one or the other every month on the third Saturday in the Family Life Center. (See the specific schedule of upcoming degrees at St. Stephen elsewhere in the newsletter.)

Also, several degree team members have been working to achieve certification from the state Council to conduct Knighthood degree exemplifications—that certification is currently scheduled for March 3, in Clearwater. We hope that this will increase the availability of Knighthood degree exemplifications in our immediate area.

For the "old-timers"—those who received their degrees before the current revisions went into effect—there is an additional incentive for you to attend and observe a degree. In the revised ceremonials, candidates at the formation and Knighthood degrees receive a physical memento reminding them of the lessons taught, somewhat akin to the rosary every Knight receives in his admissions degree.

Here is the incentive—if any member of St. Stephen Council, who previously has not received the memento, attends and observers the corresponding degree exemplification (formation or Knighthood) that is conducted by the St. Stephen Degree Team, the member will receive that memento as a gift. These mementos have value only to those who have attended the revised exemplifications and are a reminder of the lessons that they teach.

If you are a first or second degree member, I strongly encourage you to complete your journey to full Knighthood in the third degree. If are an "old-timer", please come and observe the revised exemplifications conducted by our degree team members. You will be impressed with their dedication and professionalism.

And, if you want to join this group of professionals, please contact me—we are always looking for new talent!

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention something about the patriotic (Fourth) degree. While not required for a member to achieve full Knighthood, it does earn the member the title of "Sir Knight", which is usually abbreviated "S/K". More importantly, this degree teaches that loyalty and commitment to the Church and loyalty and commitment to our country are not incompatible. In the early days of the Order, American Catholics were often viewed as unreliable and, in some cases, even traitorous, because of our loyalty to the Holy Father, a foreign dignitary.

While those viewpoints are much in the minority today, the patriotic degree still teaches us that we can be proud to be called "American Catholics". 
