



Special June feasts to put on your calendar

June is full of an array of joyful liturgical feasts that help us draw closer to Jesus Christ and the saints.

June is a unique month in the liturgical year, as it follows the Easter season and resumes the celebration of Ordinary Time.

It contains a number of joyful feasts that highlight various aspects of the faith, as well as helping us to celebrate the lives of saints who laid the foundation of the Church.

Be sure to put these important feasts on your calendar!

St. Charles Lwanga and Companions (June 3)

A memorial celebrating the lives of 22 Ugandan martyrs who were killed in the 19th century.

Corpus Christi (June 4 or June 6)

Celebrated on the Thursday or Sunday following the feast of Trinity Sunday, Corpus Christi focuses on the true presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

St. Ephrem (June 9)

St. Ephrem is a Doctor of the Church and composed many poems and hymns to the Blessed Virgin Mary in the 4th century.

Sacred Heart of Jesus (June 11)

This feast, following the celebration of Corpus Christi, honors Jesus and the immense love he has for us in his Heart.

Immaculate Heart of Mary (June 12)

Connected to the feast of the Sacred Heart, the memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary highlights the Virgin Mary's pure and virtuous heart.

St. Aloysius Gonzaga (June 21)

A 16th-century Jesuit, St. Aloysius carried the sick and dying to the hospital when a plague hit the city of Rome.

St. Thomas More (June 22)

An English martyr of the 16th century, St. Thomas More refused to approve Henry VIII's divorce and remarriage and the establishment of the Church of England.

Birth of St. John the Baptist (June 24)

This feast celebrates the birth of St. John the Baptist, the "forerunner" who prepared the way for the birth of Jesus.

St. Josemaria Escriva (June 26)

Founder of Opus Dei, St. Josemaria was an influential Spanish priest during the 20th century.

St. Irenaeus (June 28)

A Father of the Church, St. Ireaneus lived in the 2nd century and was a vital part of the early Church.


Sts. Peter and Paul (June 29)

The feast of Sts. Peter and Paul celebrates the lives of the apostle Peter and the missionary Paul, both essential leaders in the early Church.

First Martyrs of the Church of Rome (June 30)

This final feast of June honors the sacrifice of the Christians who died from the persecution of Emperor Nero in the year 64.

Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ez 17:22-24 | 2 Cor 5:6-10 | Mk 4:26-34

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Many years ago, I met someone whose attentive hospitality cast a seed in me that took root and enabled me to grow as a disciple of Jesus. At the meetings I attended with her, Sister Bridget would immediately greet everyone with a smile, outstretched hand, and, "Hello, I'm Sister Bridget; what's your name?" You couldn't help but feel at ease with her warm greeting, but it didn't end there. Throughout the encounter, she remained just as positive and as completely present as she had in the beginning. Just like the parable of the man scattering seed in today's Gospel, Sister Bridget didn't know how the seed of God's word would grow as she sowed it in her unique, joyful way. To her, maybe her graciousness was the smallest gesture. But the Lord allowed it to sprout and grow, yielding fruit and a bountiful harvest.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel verse within the Alleluia proclaims, "The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower. All who come to him will live forever." By our baptism, we are called to continue the work of Christ, sowing the word of God in our world. This may seem an intimidating expectation for all of us who doubt that we have the expertise to "sow" God's word. But in today's Gospel, Jesus tells the crowds that the kingdom of God is like the smallest of seeds, that once sown, becomes the largest of plants. If we believe in Christ and "aspire to please him," God can use our smallest gestures to sow his word in the world. We may not see how our small acts of kindness accomplish this. But if we scatter these "seeds" out of love for God, we can trust they will take root, grow abundantly, and call others to "come to him [and] live forever."

INVITE What "seeds" of welcome can you scatter among those you encounter? Make your "random acts of kindness" regular, intentional acts that express God's love. As St. Thérèse of Lisieux said: "Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smallest right and doing it all for love."

St. Anthony Can Find Anything — Even You

"Tony, Tony, come around! Something is lost and it must be found."

Did you learn this one when you were a kid? In my experience there are even a lot of lapsed Catholics — or people who were never Catholic at all — who know that when you lose something, St. Anthony becomes your best friend. Missing keys? Pray to St. Anthony. Can't find your favorite sweater? St. Anthony. Forget where you parked your car in the mall lot? St. Anth— okay, you get the idea. Whatever it is, large or small, important or trivial, Tony has a reputation for finding the lost things.

It's a devotion that can seem a little like superstition — witchcraft, even? — if you don't really understand it. Mumble an incantation to a dead guy and you're guaranteed to find your sunglasses. But as with most traditions that are old, beloved and effective, looking a little closer reveals the truth of the matter.

When we lose something really important, what do we do? We make the whole household stop what they're doing to join the search. Having St. Anthony as a friend means you ask him to stop what he's doing to help, too. And how he helps is by taking the matter exactly where all matters need to go — straight to the feet of Christ.

Here's the real genius of St Anthony: he takes the most mundane, commonplace occurrence — misplacing socks — into an encounter with the divine and truly all things great and small are gifts from God. He grabs our hand and points to the cross. "That's what you're looking for," he tells us.

In the end, Tony doesn't really find the lost things. He finds the lost people.

Be Prepared

In the storms of life, we turn to God and pray that we will be spared from harm. We are also called to take the necessary precautions to protect the precious gift of life and to minimize damage to property. Here are a few helpful reminders:

Evacuation Shelters:

If you are elderly or have special needs, please contact your county's Emergency Management Office to preregister prior to any storm if you will need to evacuate.

Mass Participation:

All parishioners are urged to use good judgment when deciding if conditions are safe to travel to Mass. In the event that roadways are not clear and weather conditions are unsafe to travel, the faithful are reminded that the obligation to participate in the Sunday Mass does not apply when there is grave difficulty in fulfilling this obligation (Code of Canon Law, Canon 1248 §2).
