
In honor of the saint's feast day tomorrow, take the time to reflect on his wise words.


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

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Oh no," was my first thought when I began reading today's Gospel – "another scribe trying to trick Jesus." But this scribe agrees with Jesus: Loving God and loving your neighbor as yourself are the greatest commandments. When the scribe explains that loving God and your neighbor are worth more than all offerings or sacrifices, Jesus recognizes that the scribe took these commandments "to heart," as Moses had taught. He doesn't just know the law, he understands it. Because he understands it, Jesus assures him that he is not far from the kingdom of God. So, how can we grow in our understanding of what it means to love God and love our neighbor? We do this by spending time with Scripture and "taking to heart" his words; by prayerfully reflecting on Jesus' life and giving thanks for his sacrifice for us; by drawing closer to him through the sacraments; and by asking him to help us grow in our love for God, and for one another. An authentic love for God will show itself in love of neighbor, and the more we truly love one another, the greater our love for God will grow.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Loving our neighbors is essential if we seek to draw them to God's love. For many of us, that's much easier said than done. It's not easy to love someone with whom we disagree or are in competition with. And these days, with so much division in society, it is all too simple to assume the worst rather than the best about others with whom we interact, or see on television. Can we commit to truly seeing others as God sees them – his beloved children, made in his own image? After all, it is through Jesus and in keeping his word that we become more like him, in thought and deed: "Whoever loves me will keep my word ... and my father will love him and we will come to him." Let us pray to see our neighbors as the Lord does; and pray that we ourselves might be the kind of neighbor in whom others may see God's image! We have the opportunity to be an example of, and a witness to, a love that forgives and is not overcome by fear or division.

PRAY As we prepare for the feast of All Souls, make an effort to see others as God sees them by reflecting on the lives of those who have loved you and what their lives have taught you about God's love. Attend Mass and give thanks for those you hold in your heart. Then pray honestly and sincerely for those with whom you know you have a difference of conviction or opinion, asking God to graciously answer all their needs and to care for them as you yourself would like to be cared for.



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

The Daily Examen of Stewardship

"Stewardship" can get a bum rap these days. When folks hear the term "stewardship" from the pulpit, their eyes tend to kind of glaze over. "Here's Father asking for more money," they groan inwardly, "Get ready for the passing of the pledge cards."

Christ refutes this idea when he gives us what he calls the greatest commandments — instructing us to love God and to love our neighbor. Now, Christ is a man who chose his words carefully. He meant exactly what he said — and he didn't say that the greatest commandments were to tithe and to give money to charity. If he had wanted stewardship to be only about money, he would have said so.

Sometimes we are indeed called to show our love for God and neighbor in the form of a financial gift. But the concept of Everyday Stewardship—living mindfully in prayer, grateful for our blessings, and gracious to our neighbors, committed to God, and accountable to each other—is about so much more.

I propose a twist on the long-held practice of the "Daily Examen" — a pious devotion wherein, at day's end, we go over the events of the last 24 hours and discern God's will. A Daily Examen of Stewardship might contain questions like this:

How did I love God today? In whom did I love Him?

What did God give me today? With whom did I share it? What did I give to Him?

To whom did I reach out today? Who reached out to me? Where was God on my list of priorities today? First? Second? Third, fourth? — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPi

THE NUMBER 13 – AN UNLUCKY NUMBER – OR IS IT?

"I am from heaven"," I have come to ask you to come here for six months in succession, on the 13th day of each month, at this same hour. Afterwards I will return here yet a 7th time"

These words, the beginning of statements and instructions given by our Blessed Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, in the Apparitions to three young children, Lucia dos Santos age 10, Blessed Francesco Marto age 9, and Blessed Jacinta Marto age 8, on a hill "Cova da Iria" outside the town of Aljustrel, Portugal in the diocese of Fatima on May 13, 1917 as the children tended their sheep and prayed the rosary.

Our Lady had come to give us a message from Jesus and the import of that message is "the avoidance of sin and, by implication, of the fires of purgatory, by conforming one's will here in time to the Will of God who dwells in the eternal Now ..." Our Lady's mention of purgatory to the children is a stark rebuff to our world, many of whose religious leaders choose to teach that purgatory doesn't exist. Indeed, it does exist; all sin, even though forgiven, still deserves punishment to remove the stain of sin left on one's soul before that soul may go before God Almighty.

Our Lady asked: "Are you willing to offer yourselves to God and bear witness and all the sufferings He wills to send you, as an act of reparation for the sins by which He is offended, and of the supplication for the conversion of sinners." The children said, "yes we are willing!" The Blessed Lady opened her hands and showed them the light of God and replied, "Then you are going to have much to suffer but the grace of God will be your comfortPray the Rosary every day, in order to obtain peace for the world, and the end of the war. (WWI).

If it were you, seeing the light and the Blessed Mother is like saying, you have just experienced something of a state of perfection, a glimpse into heaven. But you do not live on that plane. Rather you live in a very perilous world beset by strife and evils, especially today. But you can do something about those evils, if you but believe, and strive towards the heaven you have glimpsed, and I'll

tell what it is – <u>Pray the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary every</u> day, as she instructed the children.

And you my fellow parishioners are fortunate in that you belong to a parish that features a Rosary Ministry. The ministry has a group of parishioners that pray the Rosary every day six days a week (M-S) saying the "Pro-Life Meditations on the Mysteries of the Rosary" by Fr. Frank Pavone, *Priests For Life* Order. The rosary is prayed immediately following the daily 8:00am Mass in church. The Rosary is lead by Sacristan and KOC member Charles Ankerberg, Jr..

All parishioners are graciously invited to attend daily mass and participate in praying the Rosary. Intentions for the rosary are stated each day and include abolition of abortion, the personal intentions of the participants, special intentions of the day and world peace. Won't you come pray with us to support abolishing the terrible sin of abortion, to help remove the veil of deceit Satan has placed over hearts, which portrays promiscuity as a freedom, and reveal it for what it is – slavery to sin.

And so, the question "is the number 13" an unlucky number?

We have been blessed by the appearance of the Blessed Mother and have become the beneficiaries of her messages from her Divine Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ to the world, through three small children. It is the number the Blessed Mother used. She came on the 13 day of each month for 7 months in 1917 to the children of Fatima, and performed the Miracle of the Sun on October 13 of that same year. Isn't it our LUCKY NUMBER. Wouldn't you agree?
