hristmas has been so reclaimed by a godless world that a growing number of our contemporaries have forgotten its origin. Certainly, the Nativity scene gives them a general idea, but they do not know that this little child lying in a simple manger has come to bring them the love and joy they desperately seek.

Instead of bringing hope, Christmas time for so many is an opportunity to feel even more acutely the emptiness of an existence without ideals, the weight of loneliness, bitterness over the lack of money, and disgust with oneself and others.

We cannot resign ourselves to the materialistic usurpation of Christmas. We are responsible for our brethren; we are responsible for the Gospel that the Lord has entrusted to us. We must evangelize. It is not optional, it is a duty. And it is especially so in this time of Advent. God sent angels to the shepherds to tell them that a Savior had been born. Today He is sending us.

"I am sending you like sheep among wolves" (Mt 10:16). Jesus warned us. So let's not be surprised when we are misunderstood, mocked or scorned. Let's not worry about the obstacles that arise to discourage our evangelizing zeal: in a way, this is a rather good sign. The Evil One does not like joy and seeks by all means to prevent us from spreading it. Evangelizing has never been easy, but if the Lord asks us, He will give us the means to do so. Let us trust Him.

Announcing the joy of Christmas is first of all about living it and sharing it.

How can the world believe in the Good News of Christmas if Christians, like others, are mired in their own worries, monopolized by the race for money and material goods, more concerned about what food is on their plate than about the fate of their neighbor? During this time of Advent, let us ask ourselves what the meaning of Christmas is for us. What is the true essence of Christmas? What does this essence change, or what should it change, in our lives? These weeks leading up to Christmas are offered as an opportunity for conversion. If we do not enter fully into the mystery of Christmas, we will not be able to evangelize.

It is up to each family to find ways to do this: make a Christmas Eve meal for an elderly neighbor, call distant relatives or friends (a phone call can be a very beautiful Christmas gift), or make Christmas cards or small gifts (cakes, bars, cookies) to give someone who lives alone.

Announcing the joy of Christmas is also a reminder that, in time and beyond time, God became man to save us from evil and death, that Santa Claus is only a legendary character while Jesus is real, that He is alive today, that the Christmas story is not a beautiful past legend but a message of Good News that is still relevant today.



Fourth Sunday of Advent

Is 7:10-14 | Rom 1:1-7 | Mt 1:18-24

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In our family's department-store Nativity set, Joseph blends into the background: Mary and the infant Jesus steal the scene, she in her blue robes and looking over the sweet, tiny and vulnerable Son of God. Even the Magi stand out more than humble Joseph. Yet today's Gospel focuses on Jesus' earthly father, whom many of us Catholics grew to know a little better during the Year of St. Joseph in 2021. Imagine Joseph's shock at learning Mary was pregnant! Rather than quietly divorcing her, he accepts the angel's words at face value: "For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her. She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." Joseph takes Mary into his home and embraces her and the child Jesus she bears. As we celebrate this fourth Sunday of Advent, we can all do well to follow Joseph and Mary's example by saying "yes" to God, even though it may turn our lives upside down. We can dust off our Nativity scenes and ask the Lord to help us prepare our hearts and homes for Jesus.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I remember our first trip to the pediatrician with our newborn. Our job as parents, he said in so many words, was to raise him so that he'd be ready to leave us at 18. As our youngest approaches that milestone, I'm having a hard time letting go. In his apostolic letter Patris Corde, Pope Francis holds up St. Joseph as an example of what it means to be a father (and I think this applies to mothers, too): "Every child is the bearer of a unique mystery that can only be brought to light with the help of a father who respects that child's freedom. A father who realizes that he is most a father and educator at the point when he becomes 'useless,' when he sees that his child has become independent and can walk the paths of life unaccompanied. When he becomes like Joseph, who always knew that his child was not his own but had merely been entrusted to his care." Joseph and Mary loved Jesus in this way, accepting that Jesus did not "belong" to them but to all of us. Whether or not we are parents, we can learn from their example, entrusting our lives and those of our loved ones to God. As St. Paul reminds us, we "belong to Jesus Christ."

ACTION "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel, which means 'God is with us.'" As you light the Advent candles or say evening prayers this week, reflect on the ways Jesus has made his presence known to you today and give thanks.

Marriage Jubilee



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

St. Joseph the Steward

St. Joseph is one of the greatest examples of stewardship we have in the Gospels. Here is a man who understands care and reverence for the property of God, a man chosen to be steward over the very life and breath of God's Son and Spouse.

Joseph was mindful. He recognized what belonged to God. When he understood that Mary was to be the mother of God, he was not jealous or bitter. He did not presume to claim ownership over her.

Joseph was prayerful. He accepted the opportunity to be in relationship with God, even if it was in a radical and unexpected way. How many of us would trust a crazy dream we have where an angel tells us our fiancée is carrying the Son of God? Well, those of us who are already profoundly connected to God through prayer. Joseph was open to receiving God, and so he was open to the truth in a way many of us would not have been.

Joseph was gracious. Even before he had full understanding of the situation, he was unwilling to expose Mary to shame. He did not give himself over to feelings of betrayal.

Joseph was committed. He persevered. The Lord had no shortage of strange and even dangerous-sounding tasks for Joseph, but he submitted to each one.

Joseph was accountable. When he awoke from his dream, "he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him, and took his wife into his home."

Joseph was a man entrusted with many gifts, and he gave of them wisely. Let us pray that we have the grace to follow in his example.

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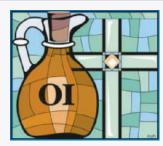

Distributions must be made directly from your IRA account to your parish, or directly from your IRA account to the Diocese of St. Petersburg for the benefit of your parish.
