## Mass prep – 30 seconds/3 points: 5 Tips from Jesus for Advent

Let's turn to Our Lord himself for advice on how to live this joyful season.

### 1. Joyful Expectation

Advent – a time of joyful expectation. The Gospel of the first Sunday of Advent tells us about the waiting for the Son of Man. And Advent itself is precisely a time of joyful waiting for Christmas. In this climate, Jesus gives five practical pieces of advice.

## 2. Key Words

#### Take heart

Advent is a time to **take care of your life and spiritual health**, which is why you need retreats – including online retreats, days of recollection, and other ways to get to your heart.

#### Lift up your heads

In other words: Be courageous, do not be afraid! Look with courage and optimism at your life and your future, and at the same time, lift your heads above what you are doing, see more, expand your horizons.

#### Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy

Jesus does not say to look out for others, but to keep watch over oneself, which means **starting with one-self.** So that as Jesus warns in today's Gospel: "that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life and that day catch you by surprise like a trap" Luke 21:34–35.

#### Be vigilant

Being vigilant means keeping our eyes and ears open to what is happening around us. It consists in recognizing the signs of the times that God gives us each day, and also seeing how He cares for us. **Being vigilant means being sensitive to the signs of God in our lives**.

#### Pray at all times

## First Sunday of Advent

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In a nineteenth-century sermon, St. John Henry Newman wrote of today's Gospel: "[Jesus] mercifully whispers into our ears ... not to share in the general unbelief [around us], not to be carried away by the world but to 'beware, keep alert' and look out for his coming." I love the thought that Jesus is "mercifully whispering" to us. Welcome to Advent! We know that Advent is a time of anticipation and preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ, but today's readings also speak to me of training ourselves to be alert for God's presence in the small, everyday moments of our lives. In his Letter to the Corinthians, Paul writes that "[we] are not lacking in any spiritual gift" as we await the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are gifted with his grace. Our loving God bestows countless graces on us each day, and with the help of the Holy Spirit we can seek ways to be more aware of these graces. Yes, we can be more "alert" to them, but can also be thankful for these small moments of God's presence with us.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Advent is a season of joyful hope. "I hope I can get my Christmas shopping done in time ... I hope I have time to get my house decorated this weekend." We all have "hopes and dreams" for this time of year, and, God-willing we will be blessed with a truly festive and joyous holiday season with our families. For Catholics, though, this season of "joyful hope" is one that has a much deeper meaning. We long for the return of Christ and our eternal union with him with a hope that is built on the promises of Jesus in the Scriptures. Our hope is not passive, but active. We know that God is always there for us, comforting us in bad times and rejoicing with us in times of happiness. Let us give thanks for our Triune God who desires to be in relationship with us enough that he sent his Son to take on our humanity. And let us silence any noise in our hearts so as to hear Jesus' merciful whisper of encouragement to be on the watch for his coming.



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## Celebrating with the Advent Wreath

One way to prepare for Christ's coming into our lives is to make an Advent wreath for your daily household worship. This traditional circular wreath reminds us that God, like the circle, has no beginning and no end. Evergreens on the wreath symbolize our everlasting relationship with God, the source of continuous new life.

The wreath has four candles, three purple or violet and one rose. On the First Sunday and Week of Advent, we light the first candle and then an additional candle on each Sunday until Christmas. Purple is a royal color, reflecting the kingship of Christ and also repentance. The rose candle, lighted on the Third Sunday of Advent, represents joy. Thus, the colors of the candles illustrate the themes of Advent: kingship, repentance and joy. The candles also remind us that the incarnation has transformed the darkness of hatred and evil into the light of joy and love.

Let your Advent wreath become the center around which your household gathers together each night during this joyous, but sometimes frenzied, season of celebration. And as you celebrate with the Advent wreath, include your favorite Advent hymns and songs, scripture readings and prayers focusing on Christ's threefold Advent—past, present and future.

Lord God of all creation,
you came among us as an infant
in Bethlehem long ago.
Come to us now
as we prepare to celebrate your birth
and look forward to your coming
in glory at the end of time.
May the light of this wreath remind us
of the power of your steadfast love for us
over the darkness of fear, evil and death.
May we praise you all the days of our lives.
Bless our preparation for your coming. Amen

## THE "O ANTIPHONS"

The **O** Antiphons refer to the seven verses that are recited (or chanted) preceding the *Magnificat* during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours. They cover the special period of Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas, December 17-23. These antiphons form the basis of the Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," put to music in 15th century France.

**December 17**—*O Wisdom*, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

**December 18**—O Sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

**December 19**—O Flower of Jesse's Stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

**December 20**—O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of heaven: come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.

**December 21**—*O Radiant Dawn*, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice, come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.


**December 22**—O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart, O Keystone of the mighty arch of humanity, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust.

**December 23**—O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God.

## Advent Prepares us for the THE BIRTH OF CHRIST



### Dear Friends in Christ,

During the past several weeks, I have studied Pope Emeritus Benedict's Encyclical on Hope, and the messages of his Pastoral Visit to the United States in April of 2008. In my Advent Message, I am sharing with you some of the highlights expressed by Pope Emeritus benedict, XVI, and some of my personal thoughts.

The Advent season is a joyful time of year as we prepare to celebrate the great Solemnity of Christmas. It is an invitation to hope, pointing to the horizon of history and to the light of the Savior who comes. On Christmas a great light will appear in the darkness of the night. The Lord will come in all his glory. His splendor fills the whole world. Advent is a favorable time for the rediscovery of a hope that is not vague and deceptive, but certain and reliable because it is anchored in Christ, God made man, the rock of our salvation.

In the days ahead we will be captivated by the ancient story of a baby born into poverty and persecution, whose destiny it was to lift the iron burden of despair of his fellow man. In the twenty-one centuries that have transpired from that sacred moment of his birth, mankind has never been free of the ravages of disease, illiteracy, hunger, and man's inhumanity to man. Yet the star of Bethlehem burns in our hearts with a warmth that is not diminished by the years or discouraged by our failures.

However, at the same time a sadness covers the whole world in this epoch of history, because of an absence of God in the global community. Who can deny that the present moment is a crossroads, not only for the Roman Catholic Church, but also for mankind? We are living in a dangerous time, especially in the Middle East. The world is at war to bring down the reign of terrorism, that strikes at the heart of humanity. It is also a time of great promise, as we see the human family in many ways drawing closer together and becoming ever more interdependent. However, at the same time we see clear signs of a disturbing breakdown in the very foundations of society: signs of alienation, anger and polarization on the part of many of our contemporaries; increased violence; a weakening of the moral sense; a political climate not open to working together for the people; a society and a government filled with greed and corruption that leaves the people groaning out of desperation; a coarsening of social relations; and growing forgetfulness of Christ and God. We also see signs, even painfully, of the presence of division in our midst, as well as the troubling realization that many, rather than acting as a spiritual leaven in society, are inclined to embrace attitudes contrary to the truth of the Gospel.

On this first Sunday of Advent we are reminded that Christ is the hope of a restless searching humanity. In hope we are saved. As the Church in America gives thanks for over two hundred years, we are invited to trust in the power of grace and to create a future of promise for God's people in this country and throughout the world. I ask you in the Lord Jesus, to set aside all division and to work with joy to prepare a way for Christ in fidelity to his word and in constant conversion to his will. Above all, I urge you to continue to be a leaven of evangelical hope in American society and the wider world, striving to bring the light of truth to the Gospel, and the task of building an even more just and free world for generations to come.

The Lord bestowed the gift of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and granted them the authority to forgive sins. Through the surpassing power of Christ's grace, entrusted to frail human ministers, the Church is constantly reborn and each of us is given the hope of a new beginning. Let us trust in the Spirit's power to inspire conversion, to heal every wound, to overcome every division, and to inspire a new life of freedom. How much we need these gifts! How much, and how near they are, particularly in the sacrament of Penance! The liberating power of this sacrament, in which our honest confession of sin is met by God's merciful words of pardon and peace, need to be rediscovered and appropriated by every Catholic. The renewal of the Church, our parish, our country, and the world, depends on the renewal of the practice of penance and the growth of holiness which the sacrament both inspires and accomplishes. *Our Penance Service at Blessed Trinity will take place on December 14, at 7:00 p.m. followed by individual confession. Several priests and religious will be available to hear confession.* 

Those who have hope must live different lives! I encourage all parishioners to join me in renewing our spiritual heritage as Catholic Christians. I am suggesting that that we all take time from our busy schedule to come to the Church in the presence of the tabernacle and pray for the conversion of all people throughout the world, and for peace among all nations. On December 6th,13th, and 20th, the Church will remain open all day to come and pray. At 7:00 p.m. we will have Eucharistic Exposition, Adoration and at 8:00 p.m., Benediction.

I urge everyone to make this the highest priority of your life. By your prayers, by the witness of your faith, and by the fruitfulness of your charity, and may you point the way towards the vast horizon of hope, which God is even now opening in his Church, and to all humanity the vision of a world reconciled and renewed in Christ Jesus, our savior. Jesus is the way that leads to eternal happiness, the truth that

satisfies the deepest longings of every heart, and the life that brings new joy and hope, to us and to our world.

May the Advent Season, and the joy of the coming of the Christ Child in the manger be that light that guides you to your greater destiny.
