Our goal should be to give without counting the cost

Sometimes we can be hesitant about our giving, not wanting to give too much of our money or possessions away, afraid of making any major sacrifice.

Jesus was clear that we should give to the poor generously. He did not provide an exact amount, or tell us precisely what we should give to those in need.

The primary requirement is that we should **give**.

Yet, many of us hesitate to be generous, often holding too tightly our own possessions.

It's true that some of us don't have much and we already give all that we can bear.

At the same time, most of us likely don't give enough, only giving pennies when we have millions of dollars saved up for a rainy day.

The cheerful giver

Ideally what we should do is give from a joyful heart. This means that we don't hoard our wealth to ourselves, but generously give the poor what we can cheerfully.



St. Gregory of Nazianzen points this out in a homily that is provided in the *Office of Readings*:

When we perform an act of kindness we should rejoice and not be sad about it. If you undo the shackles and the thongs, says Isaiah, that is, if you do away with miserliness and counting the cost, with hesitation and grumbling, what will be the result? Something great and wonderful! What a marvelous reward there will be: Your light will break forth like the dawn, and your healing will rise up quickly. Who would not aspire to light and healing.

It is good to give, but it is better to give with a joyful heart.

This doesn't mean that giving will be easy or that it won't hurt, but if we trust God and his goodness, we can experience a profound peace when we give.

Above all we need to remember that we are giving to Jesus Christ, as St. Gregory explains:

The Lord of all asks for mercy, not sacrifice, and mercy is greater than myriads of fattened lambs. Let us then show him mercy in the persons of the poor and those who today are lying on the ground, so that when we come to leave this world they may receive us into everlasting dwelling places, in Christ our Lord himself, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Whenever we show mercy and give to those in need, we are showing mercy and giving to Jesus Christ.

This reality should help us to recognize Jesus in the poor and to do all that we do in a spirit of love and compassion.

Fifth Sunday of Lent

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE Today's culture creates and sees constant change, innovation, and novelty at record speeds. But even more astounding than the technological advancements we observe around us is God's power to inspire interior transformation in each individual life. In today's Gospel, instead of condemning the woman caught in adultery whose punishment was certain death, Jesus speaks words of mercy, forgiveness, and life. Their encounter lifts the woman out of the shame of her sin, restores her dignity, and strengthens her to "Go, and from now on do not sin any more." This woman, whom others saw as hopeless, is transformed because Jesus' mercy has touched her soul. Long before, the prophet Isaiah had alluded to this time in which the Messiah would bring new life even in the most desolate places: "See, I am doing something new! Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? In the desert I make a way, in the wasteland, rivers." God constantly calls us to leave sin behind, to keep moving forward - and we can be confident

that he is with us at each new step to lead us to himself.

How do we take these steps? How do we respond to God's call? In his Letter to the Philippians, Paul speaks of how he willingly gave up everything, even those things which made him righteous according to the laws of the Old Testament, and learned to depend on Jesus and the changing power of his resurrection. For us as for Saint Paul, each step along the path of transformation requires faith in God's ability and intention to heal us and draw us to himself. If we are willing to leave behind old identities and desires, we will see more clearly the true identity God created for us as we begin to live more like Jesus. Paul even describes being "taken possession of by Christ Jesus," because the change is so deep and powerful. For us as for God's chosen people in the readings from Isaiah, at first some parts of the path may look like an aimless desert, but the way will appear with each step of faith, and it is filled with mercy.

Transformation doesn't happen all at once. Reflect on your Lenten prayers, fasting, and almsgiving and consider how they've helped to conform your will to God's. How will you be found changed on Easter Sunday? Is there something you can improve upon during these final two weeks of Lent? It's not too late to offer a loving sacrifice to God!
