Advent invites us to stop scrolling and pause in silence

We can be distracted in a variety of ways in our daily lives. Advent is a time when we can take a break and contemplate the presence of God.

For many of us, our daily life consists of walking around, looking down at our phone, hoping the next thing we see will offer us a moment of happiness.

Often it is how we cope with our own situation and the suffering we may be enduring on the inside.

Advent can help us break from that cycle, put down our phone, and enter into the presence of God.

God wants to speak to you

Pope Benedict XVI reflected on a similar theme during a homily in 2009, stating how the world can "monopolize" our attention:

In our daily lives we all experience having little time for the Lord and also little time for ourselves. We end by being absorbed in "doing". Is it not true that activities often absorb us and that society with its multiple interests monopolizes our attention? Is it not true that we devote a lot of time to entertainment and to various kinds of amusement? At times we get carried away.

Advent is the perfect opportunity to evaluate our own screen time and to compare it to the time we are open to God's presence.

The good news is that God is already knocking at our door, but we need to open it to him and stop what we are doing, as Pope Benedict XVI explains:

The meaning of the expression "advent" therefore includes that of *visitatio*, which simply and specifically means "visit"; in this case it is a question of a visit from God: **he enters my life and wishes to speak to me**...Advent, this powerful liturgical season that we are beginning, invites us to **pause in silence to understand a presence**. It is an invitation to understand that the individual events of the day are hints that God is giving us, **signs of the attention he has for each one of us**.

God wants to "visit" us and to speak to our hearts. However, we need to be listening to him and that requires focused attention, without any distractions to prevent the ears of our heart from hearing his voice.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

For many in the upper latitudes of the northern hemisphere, this is the darkest time of the year, the time when the duration of daylight is at its lowest. It's providential, then, that our first reading calls us to "walk in the light of the Lord!" Paul tells us that we do this by "throw[ing] off the works of darkness" and "put[ing] on the armor of light." While we might not struggle with the vices listed in Paul's Letter to the Romans, each of us has our own struggles against sin. As we begin this Advent season, let us take time to do a thorough examination of conscience to discern areas of weakness and sin – those "works of darkness" Paul talks about – in our own lives. Then, consider taking up practices that help you to foster the opposing virtues to arm yourself against these temptations. As you grow in these virtues, you'll certainly be on your way up the mountain of the Lord and walking in his light!

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel calls us to vigilance. Jesus tells us, "Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." While he is speaking about our need to be ready to meet the Lord when he comes at the end of our lives, it's also an invitation for us to always be ready to share our faith with others whenever the opportunity presents itself. As Scripture says, we should "always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you a reason for your hope." (1 Pet 3:15) We never know the moment when someone will come to us in need of prayer, a word of encouragement, or with questions related to their own spiritual hunger. We must always be ready to meet them where they are and offer a word of hope.

PRAY

Take a moment to pray this week for those "divine appointments" - those individuals who might come your way - seeking encouragement or insight into the spiritual questions in their lives. Ask for the grace to be "awake" so that you're ready to meet them when they come. We can't always predict when these encounters will happen, but we can prepare ourselves to receive these persons as Christ and offer them our full attention and love.



Music Ministry Moment

Why does Music during Mass change at Advent?

Music at Mass changes during Advent to reflect the season's themes of anticipation, watchful waiting, and spiritual preparation for the arrival of Christ. Music is more subdued, reflective, and somber than Christmas music, with a focus on themes of longing and preparation rather than the full celebration of Jesus' birth.

Why don't we sing the Gloria during Advent?

Music at Mass should always reflect the liturgical season and set the appropriate tone of the scriptures from which music is chosen. The first words of the Gloria come from the Angels singing it to the shepherds the night Jesus was born, so it shouldn't be sung as we await the birth. When we sing the Gloria at Midnight Mass, it introduces the great celebration of Christ's arrival!

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Learn About the Parish Trip to Rome in 2027!



RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Wide-Open Eyes

When my first child was born, we had a nursery created for him that featured images from "The Beginner's Bible" painted on all the walls. (You may have seen this Bible before, where the Biblical figures in the book all had large wide-open eyes.) Images of Adam and Eve, David and Goliath, and Jesus were displayed on all four walls. On the largest wall was a big picture of Noah's Ark with lots of animals. As our son got older, we would point to images on the wall as we read bedtime stories to him. Our son is now in his 20's and living several hours from us, so those days are far behind in our rearview mirror of life.

We prepared quite a lot for his birth. When our next two children were born, the preparation time had decreased significantly. Most parents know what I am talking about. The newness of your first-born brings with it so much emotion that you are compelled to spend countless hours preparing. When the next children are born, you are certainly excited, but you act differently and with a little more reserve.

For most readers, this is not your first Advent. It probably won't be your last. If you approach these December days simply as a way to prepare for Christmas, you may find yourself just doing the same old thing as last year. However, if you spend this time reflecting on the time when Jesus returns or when you shall see him face-to-face, you might be able to stir up some of that emotion of anticipation within you. Jesus *is* coming again. When people of all ages understand that reality, it can be a cause for large, wide-open eyes indeed.
