### Roll up your sleeves this Advent, invites Pope

He encouraged us to serve "without complaining," reminding that "the smile on our lips is a sign of the grace within us."

'The world becomes a better place if we sacrifice a little security and tranquility in order to choose what is right,' said Pope Leo XIV on Saturday, December 6, 2025, during the Jubilee audience held in St. Peter's Square. Before thousands of pilgrims gathered under a gentle winter sun, he reminded them that "no one saves the world alone" and urged Catholics to actively seek God in their daily lives.

After a long tour of St. Peter's Square in the popemobile, the Pope began his teaching by referring to the liturgical season of Advent. This period, he emphasized, invites believers to "learn to recognize [Jesus] each time He comes and to prepare for His return."

"This waiting is not passive," Leo XIV insisted. He called on the faithful to seek God "in the realities of life, with intelligence, with the heart and by rolling up our sleeves."

This quest, he said, concerns "in particular the lay faithful, men and women, because the God who became incarnate comes to meet us in everyday situations."

Quoting the Second Vatican Council, he emphasized the central role of the laity in building the Kingdom – a theological concept that refers both to the present world in which God manifests himself and to the promise of eternal life.

#### Alberto Marvelli, witness to hope in action

To illustrate his point, the Pope gave the example of Blessed Alberto Marvelli (1918-1946), a young Italian engineer involved in Catholic Action.

"To hope is to participate, to serve the Kingdom of God brings joy even in the midst of great risks," he said, as he recounted his life.

During the Second World War, this young Italian devoted himself to the wounded, the sick and the displaced. At the end of the conflict, he was elected city councillor and worked on reconstruction before dying tragically at the age of 28. "The world becomes a better place if we lose a little security and tranquility in order to choose the good," the Pope assured. The young man was beatified in 2004 by John Paul II.

## A call to joyful commitment

Leo XIV invited each of the faithful to reflect on their own commitment: "Am I involved in a good initiative that puts my talents at the service of others?"

He encouraged us to serve "without complaining," reminding that "the smile on our lips is a sign of the grace within us."

Hope, he insisted, is not reduced to passive waiting, but is lived in joy and generosity, even in the face of challenges. "No one saves the world alone," the Pope concluded, recalling that God Himself chooses to act "with us."


Advent, a time of preparation and hope, is an invitation to unite to build a more just and fraternal world. "Together is better," he said, emphasizing that everyone's participation makes the promise of a world renewed by love more tangible.

The pontiff will preside over the last jubilee audience of the year on December 20. The jubilee audiences have been held on Saturdays, and are open to the public like the general audiences of Wednesdays.

On January 6, 2026, Leo will close the 'holy door' of St. Peter's Basilica, thus ending the Jubilee of 2025.

The next jubilee is an extraordinary one: 2033, when we will celebrate the 2,000th anniversary of the Resurrection.

## GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

One morning, I woke up feeling exhausted after a fitful night of sleep. I was achy and generally under the weather. Despite this, I made a to-do list because the day's work still needed to be accomplished. I was determined to not let this sickness interrupt my productivity, even though I knew I needed to rest. It occurred to me, then, that rest — and dependence on others and God — is sacred also. In today's psalm, we hear of the many ways the Lord provides: The *Lord* gives, the *Lord* raises, the *Lord* loves, the *Lord* protects, the *Lord* saves. We cannot accomplish our own salvation, but we can rest in the promise the Lord provides, and we can hope in the salvation offered in Christ. As we wait in joyful anticipation for the coming of Jesus at Christmas, let us find time to rest in his Word and his presence, trusting that our salvation does not depend on us and has already come to fruition in Christ.

## REST

We are more able to see the signs of God's providence in our lives when we take time to reflect. Make time to rest in God's presence this week. This could mean stopping into a chapel for a couple minutes of quiet prayer, reflecting on Scripture using *Lectio Divina*, or reading the story of Christ's nativity in the Gospel. These simple practices will prepare our hearts to recognize Christ's presence and goodness at each moment of our lives.

## GO EVANGELIZE

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we saw in our psalm, God is the one who takes initiative, who provides for our salvation. In our work to share the faith with others, sometimes our task is simply to help others become aware of the ways God is providing for them by pointing out the signs of his action in their lives. When the disciples of John came to Jesus asking if he was "the one who is to come" or whether they should "look for another," Jesus reminds them of the evidence all around them: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, and the dead are raised. As we help others to see God's work in their lives, we are also leading them to greater faith and trust in him.



## Music Ministry Moment

### *Why does Music during Mass change at Advent?*

Music at Mass changes during Advent to reflect the season's themes of anticipation, watchful waiting, and spiritual preparation for the arrival of Christ. Music is more subdued, reflective, and somber than Christmas music, with a focus on themes of longing and preparation *rather* than the full celebration of Jesus' birth.

### *Why don't we sing the Gloria during Advent?*

Music at Mass should always reflect the liturgical season and set the appropriate tone of the scriptures from which music is chosen. The first words of the Gloria come from the Angels singing it to the shepherds the night Jesus was born, so it shouldn't be sung as we await the birth. When we sing the Gloria at Midnight Mass, it introduces the great celebration of Christ's arrival!

## What Makes You Special

John the Baptist is truly an intriguing figure of history. He was a cousin of Jesus and literally prepared all those who would listen for this new way of life ushered in by a Messiah. Besides the key role he plays in the Gospel story, his depiction in Scripture, and then in literature, movies, and other media, gives us an image of a pretty unique person. How about locusts and wild honey for dinner? Can you imagine camel's hair as a staple in your wardrobe? He lived differently, and he stood out among the status quo. Of course, his look and cuisine didn't stand out nearly as much as his message.

How do you stand out? What separates you from the crowd? God has created each of us completely unique and with a combination of gifts like no one else. How can you uncover and understand your unique gifts? First, reflect on what makes you happiest in life. We are happiest when we are using the talents God gave us. Next, think about what comes naturally to you, whether it is a skill, task, or emotion. Recurring patterns in our behavior and experiences provide clues to our giftedness. Finally, what do other people see in you? The communities we live in, whether it is our family, parish, school, or workplace are filled with people who can provide clues to us by their observations. After these steps, can you say what makes you special? Now, let's start to grow that, lean on it, and stand out in a way that brings glory to God.

### RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

#### The Season That Gives Back

*I don't have anything left to give.*

*You can't pour from an empty cup.*

*All I do is give. Who is giving to me?*

Raise your hand if these thoughts have ever run through your head. I'm sure they occur to all of us from time to time. We can become so easily depleted by the fast pace of life and whatever vocation God has called us to, whether that's parenthood, a demanding professional career or the caretaking of friends and family (or as so often happens, a hybrid of all three). Many of us also undergo certain seasons — seasons of the year, but also seasons of life — that seem to sap us of energy and leave us totally empty.

In these times, it seems impossible to continue in the spirituality of Everyday Stewardship. Graciousness, mindfulness, prayerfulness, gratitude, accountability — maintaining some semblance of these characteristics in our daily life feels not only overly optimistic, but totally impossible.

The Church gives us certain liturgical seasons that are meant to fill us up, almost like spiritual pit stops. Advent is one such season, and the Scriptural passages we reflect on at Mass during these four weeks are filled with images of nature defied. We see the dry steppe blooming. We see the weak made firm. We see the frightened made strong. We see the lame walk. We see the Virgin give birth.

If you think you don't have anything left to give this Advent, think again. This is the season of miracles when what we thought was depleted brings new life.



