A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Today is the sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary time. For two Sundays we have our Gospel readings focused on some elements of discipleship that has been the theme of the past several Sunday readings. Briefly, discipleship is a response to the call of Jesus to follow Him demanding knowledge of His person, his mission and teachings, the decision to follows him by totally leaving behind everything that would hinder oneself from making Jesus the center of our lives and finally being active agents of the mission for which Jesus himself was sent into the world, namely in order to proclaim the reign of God. These three elements were the points that the gospel of the past Sundays mentioned and which we reflected on.

Last Sunday we heard about the parable of the Good Samaritan. This story relayed by the gospel told us how Jesus wants every disciple to be a "good neighbor," just like the act of compassion that the Good Samaritan showed towards the victim of the robbers who was left half-dead on the road bypassed by a priest and a Levite for reasons that may be understood as both religious and cultural. Nonetheless it was the Good Samaritan, who went out of his way who turned out to be a true good neighbor, by being compassionate with the victim and showing his love without expecting anything in return. This is the how a disciple of Jesus is expected to treat every person, especially those who are suffering, the poor, the oppressed and those who are marginalized in society.

Our gospel reading today continues our reflections on discipleship. The story about the hospitality of Abraham may be considered as a background context in the consideration of discipleship, showing a way to consider discipleship also as a means to look on how visits our lives and how we respond to his visitations. The gospel reading speaks on how there could be two possible ways of responding to God's visitations, either by active serving him or by actively listening to him. The models given in the gospel is that of Martha who was so concerned about serving Jesus, her guest and Mary, who spent her time in attentively listening to the words of the Master. These two models have become the ways the many disciples have engaged in their response to the call of Jesus into discipleship and their participation in the mission. On the one hand, many actively involve themselves in the social concerns of the Church, working for the poor, defending the rights of the oppressed, seeking justice where their injustice reigns in the lives of people. These disciples are the socially minded followers of Jesus. On the other hand, there are so spend their lives in active contemplation, in deep prayer and silence in order to respond to the call of Jesus for discipleship.

The answer of Jesus to Martha is worth consideration. He said "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need for only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, and it will not be taken from her." This answer appears to affirm the reality that being contemplative and prayerful is only what is necessary. However, we must consider that being concerned with the plight of our brothers in need is also very important in the lives of being disciples as mentioned in the gospel read last Sunday wherein Jesus "go and do likewise" in response to the lawyer's question as who is "my neighbor." When one gives oneself in order to serve the other because of the inspiration coming from listening to Jesus, his words in Scriptures and the teachings of the Church, one becomes truly enlightened and fully aware that his work is indeed done in response to the call of discipleship. Both ways, being active and contemplative, are ways of being disciples. However, one's action on behalf of the welfare of others because of his love for Jesus whom he has listened attentively and obeyed with dedication, become a more noble way to doing one's discipleship and participating in the mission of Jesus in the world today. Let us pray that we all become attentive listeners to Jesus and His Church so that we can truly assist our brothers in need with compassion and love just like the Good Samaritan every day in our lives.

The vast majority of his legal practice is devoted to constitutional rights, including First Amendment litigation, political redistricting, defamation, and education rights.

Mr. Trissell obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in French and Philosophy as a fourth generation "Cowboy" attending Oklahoma State University and obtained his Juris Doctorate from the George Washington University Law School in 2013.

Jeff recently published a book, Unlocking the Churches, that chronicles the two-year battle during the COVID-19 pandemic to keep the Churches open for worship. He deftly weaves the history of that legal fight with fascinating historical anecdotes and clear explanations of legal terminologies and their present-day applications. He resides in San Diego, California, with his wife and two daughters.

The R.C.I.A. (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults) is now in the process of changing it's name to O.C.I.A. (Order for Christian Initiation for Adults).

The decision to change the name stems from the idea that the Catholic journey is continual. It is a lifelong commitment each catechumen or candidate is making to the Church. The word "order" also reflects the progressive nature of this

spiritual journey. OCIA is not a one-time event but a journey with distinct stages. Another reason for the name change is to more accurately portray the fact that there are multiple rites integrated into the larger process of becoming Catholic. The process itself is not one "rite."

Who is it for?

- Those who want to convert to Catholicism
- Those who want to learn more about the Catholic faith
- Catholics who need to prepare for a missed sacrament, such as Confirmation

Catholics who would like a refresher course on the basics of Catholicism

During each O.C.I.A. class we spend time answering your questions about the Catholic faith, reviewing the weekly Scripture readings from Mass, and discussing the current chapter in our book. The most important thing is getting your questions answered.
